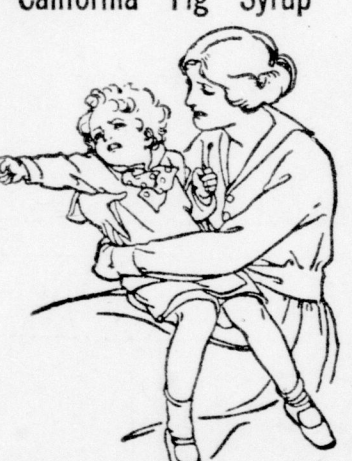

C. OF C. BANQUET STRENGTHENS TIES OF FRIENDSHIP
City Council, Middlesex County Council Tendered Banquet At Tecumseh House.
FAVOR REST-ROOM

Ties of friendship and good-will existing between the London City Council, Middlesex County Council and the London Chamber of Commerce were even more firmly entwined as a result of a dinner in the Tecumseh Hotel last night given by the directors of the Chamber of Commerce and at which members of the county and city councils were guests of honor, as well as Mrs. Geo. Edwards, Komoka, president of the Women's Institute of Ontario.
Reference was made by practically every speaker to the proposed rest room to be erected on the market square, adjoining the comfort station. A proper rest room for farm women has long been the object of the agricultural section of the C. of C., and according to the mayor and other members of the city council, it will soon be an actuality.
Major Ingram Presides.
Major Gordon Ingram, president of the Chamber of Commerce, presided at the dinner and welcomed the members of the county council and city officials. He was sorry Warden Henry was not present and asked Ex-Warden William Ross to convey his best wishes for a successful year.
"We are interested in the surrounding district and want you to feel that we are a part of the district and not a city alone," declared Major Ingram, amid applause. "We are simply a service organization and anxious to do what we can for Middlesex and the 14 counties of Western Ontario."
Mayor Wells stated that the city had recognized that improvements were necessary on the market square, and explained plans for the proposed rest room. He asked for the co-operation of the county council in arranging the details.
Ald. Anderson spoke briefly, stating a rest room was needed, and hoped the motion would pass the council.
Asks Aid of Council.
W. H. Porter, chairman of the agricultural section of the chamber of commerce, asked the county council members to give favorable consideration towards the furnishing and maintenance of the rest room. The women of Middlesex needed a room where they could sit down, stay as long as they liked, and go home when they felt like it.
Ex-Warden Ross in a humorous speech thought there should be a smoking-room for the men. He thanked the chamber of commerce for their kind dinner invitation.
Ex-Mr. P. S. Little referred to the good feeling between city and county. There should be no division between London and Middlesex, he said.
Mrs. George Edwards told of the splendid reception always given the Women's Institutes in London. The courtesies extended here were better than in any other city. North Bay was next in courtesy, Port Arthur third, Ottawa was the capital, while Toronto was a city by itself (laughter). Mrs. Edwards thanked the chamber of commerce and the city council for the splendid treatment accorded the organization she represented.
Men Welcome Also.
Mrs. Edwards told the gathering the organizations would help towards furnishing the rest room, and that the men would be just as welcome as the women.

ARREST TWO MEN FOR KENT POLICE
Believed To Be Wanted On a Charge of Raising a Check.
Smart detective work on the part of P. C. Frank Graham early last evening was responsible for the arrest of two men thought to be wanted in Chatham on a charge of raising a check.
Graham, while patrolling his beat in the downtown district, had his attention drawn to a sedan much the worse for wear and minus one window, ambling leisurely down the street, with two men as the occupants. He called on the driver to stop, and on closer observation noted a resemblance of the men whose description was sent out by High Constable Peters of Kent County. Graham ordered them to drive to the station.
The men gave their names as Smith and Kilgour. A Chatham officer is expected to arrive in the city today to identify the men and take them back to Chatham.
Graham, who is one of the younger officers on the force, has on several occasions figured in arrest where quick action and keen judgment have been the deciding factors in his favor. One outstanding arrest was when, with a gun already trained on him, he entered Van Loon's auction rooms in West London and captured the intruder single-handed.

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY STRONGLY URGED BY CHURCH BODY
Local Presbyterian Association Move To Protest To Parliament.
ALEGE OPPRESSION

Last evening the executives of the Presbyterian Church Association (London Branch) met at the home of Mrs. Kelly, Ridout street. Practically all the Presbyterian Churches of the city were represented.
Interesting reports were received from the different committees, which showed that the formation of the association had accomplished much good work particularly towards the cause for which it was organized.
A letter from the Rev. Mr. Brown of Red Deer, Alberta, was read, in which he stated that the movement against church union as on the present basis is growing in intensity. Several committees of the association had accomplished much good work particularly towards the cause for which it was organized.
After the business of the meeting the following resolution was unanimously passed:
"Whereas the assembly from the first declared that the church union question was a question for the people, and that they would not seek to consummate it without practical unanimity, and, in the atmosphere of this assurance, secured the consent of Presbyterians and the assembly; but now that they think they have this assembly have become legalists and are willing to allow all within the church to unite with other churches if they so desire it, and we will wish them well, and we are of that mind yet, and
"Whereas those opposed will certainly apply for an injunction in the courts against this proceeding, not that they wish, as will be said, to retain the whole property of the church, although we believe that by law they can do so, but to secure for all Presbyterian people deliverance from wrong and tyranny, and that religious liberty to worship according to the dictates of their conscience, which is their birthright, and
"Whereas from the first we have been willing to allow all within our church to unite with other churches if they so desire it, and we will wish them well, and we are of that mind yet, and
"Whereas the unionists, by insisting on the minimum stipend in small congregations, and refusing them aid, and under cover of co-gregations and obliterating Presbyterian property, although Presbyterians all over the church are settling ministers for less than the minimum, and are using the very money out of small churches are giving to aid causes not so needy or worthy as they are, and by all this injustice are creating great dissatisfaction with the administration of our funds and imperiling all the mission funds of the church, and
"Whereas, if the bill were passed as it is, Presbyterian property to such oppression would be forced to withdraw from a church which they do not wish to enter, and leave behind them property they have built and maintained unless in the majority, and even then would be forced to go to parliament, had in hand, to ask for incorporation in a name, in which process we would be opposed by all the powers and legal ingenuity of the unionists, for they have boldly declared that unless we can show sufficient strength we will not be allowed to continue as an incorporated church.
"We therefore commend Presbyterian people.
"1. That they appoint leading men who are opposed to the passing of such legislation to unite with others in going to Parliament to protest it.
"2. That they refuse to entertain any proposal of union with other churches until this vexed question is settled in the church and land.
"3. To have faith that the God of all justice and mercy will overcome this matter for the good of all concerned."

WESTMINSTER COUNCIL AIDS NEEDY RESIDENTS

Five half-ton lots of coal have been sent to residents of Manor Park and Byron by the Westminster Township Council within the last week. Deputy Reeve Boler stated yesterday. Numerous families in Manor Park have been provided with groceries by the council, and two other families who have asked for relief, are having their cases investigated by the township.
Mr. Boler stated that relief measures in the township were practically on the same scale as last winter and were not nearly so bad as they were two winters ago.
