Many of those fined served terms in Castle Kelly in default of payment, but Viola Nelson, Kittie Watson, Dorah Russell and "Slim" Cliff, the redroofed house gang, escaped payment of their \$50 fine without serving a day. The other heavy fines imposed in the quarter were Frank Campbell, \$20, for breaking the liquor law, and

John Morkin, \$20, for being drunk. The offences were:-Breach of bylaw 59, drunk 34, assault 7, disorderly 2, drunk and disorderly 5, drunk and vagrancy 4, keeping disorderly house 1, house of ill-fame 1, inmates 2, frequenters 1, vagrancy 4, immoderate driving 1, cruelty to animals 2, breach of the liquor law 1, indecent exposure 1.

Seventeen criminal cases were heard, 1 being for obstructing a constable, 2 for assaulting a constable, 1 of assault and wounding, 2 of fraud and the balance of stealing. The heaviest sentence imposed was on Arthur Johnston, who got nine months in the Central Prison for stealing a couple of night dresses. in the Central and as many got
