The Methodist Conference

Deputation and Receiving Reports the Order of the Day Yesterday.

Launch of Project to Raise \$250,000 for the Missions Purposes.

Rev. James Turner, president of the conference, is getting the work of the session well under way.

Rev. J. A. Wood, chairman of Kamloops district, gave an interesting address on "The New Prayer."

Rev. Sutherland, of Toronto, gave a stirring address on the work of the Missionary Society of the Church.

Rev. Dr. Herdman, of Calgary, superintendent of missions in the province of British Columbia, spoke of the missions in Toronto.

Rev. Dr. Whitton moved a resolution which was seconded by Rev. J. H. White, assuring the deputation from the Presbyterian church that the conference should extend any antagonism between the Christian churches.

Rev. J. H. White reported for the committee on the Chinese and Indian work. The doctor drew a picture of the builders of the wall in the days of Nehemiah.

Rev. Dr. Woodworth and Rev. A. S. Miller, D.D., also spoke to the resolution which was carried by a standing vote.

Communications were received from Rev. J. H. White of Toronto, Rev. Dr. Herdman, and Rev. A. S. Miller, D.D.

Ms. Chapman, who represented the Women's Missionary Society of British Columbia, gave a report bearing facts showing that the women were alive to their privileges and opportunities.

Eight hundred and ninety dollars and seventy cents had been raised, \$67.25 in advance of last year.
