Guggenheim, of New York, are now on their way to the Pa-cific coast and to British Columbia. It is stated that their mission is to examine into the feasibility of a large fead smelter for B. The new storn-wheeler Swinomish has been launched at La Conner. The new steamer, which is 91 feet in length over all, 20.4 beam, and 5½ feet depth of hold, will be put into commission about Novem-ber 15, and will do a general freighting and towing business. Her cost is \$10,000.
