

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor of the Graphic: The Doherty case has been a subject of much comment not only in Restigouche County, but also in many parts of the Maritime Provinces. Every unbiased person believes that a terrible blunder has been committed. The statement of two of the jurors, Messrs. McBeath and Ellingham shows conclusively that there was a misunderstanding in the rendering of the verdict. In view of this public acknowledgment and the storm of indignation throughout the land over such a miscarriage of justice, there should be an immediate investigation.

The Citizens of New Mills at a largely attended meeting, unanimously passed a resolution protesting against the verdict as the final issue of the case and appealing to the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council for an investigation or a new trial.

This is a step in the right direction and other communities should do the same. The Government must be made to see that the Campbellton Graphic is not merely expressing its own opinion, but the voice of the people. The Attorney General is greatly mistaken if he thinks the Graphic has gone "very far in its criticism." By no means, the Graphic is on the ground and knows the feelings of the people whose moral sense is not blunted.

The blood of one of Campbellton's most respected citizens, "richly from the ground" for justice. We have read in Holy Writ that "the Souls of them that were slain for the Word of God and for the testimony which they held, cry with a loud voice saying, "How long O Lord, Holy and True, dost Thou not judge and avenge our blood on them that dwell on the Earth."

On the highest authority we are told that the "powers that be" are ordained for the punishment of evil doers and for the praise of them that do well.

This is too serious a matter for political capital, but permit me to say that if the Government refuses to take up this case and deal with it fairly and firmly, a number of the supporters of the Government like myself, will give their answer in a very definite way. Surely their is sufficient ground for an investigation and the matter is not ultra vires. It is yet possible to retrieve the honor of the country, and vindicate the good name of the deceased and extend the hand of sympathy to the sadly bereaved family.

What are Courts and Crown officers for, but for the maintenance of justice and the well being of Society.

Let the agitation on behalf of what is just and honorable and just and good report be continued.
