BROUGHT HERE ON FORGERY CHARGE

Philip Revard Arrested At Quebec And Now Awaits Trial Here.

On the morning of Monday, the 11th inst., Philip Revard, charged with uttering a forged check, appeared before Judge Matheson for the preliminary hearing of his case.

The evidence submitted at the morning session tells the following story.

On August 19th last, a young man whose general sales suggested him to be an alert young traveling salesman little over the quarter century mark in age, registered at the Florence Hotel here under the name of Antoine La Fortun. During his short visit in town Mr. La Fortun lost no time in furnishing proof that he was not only alert but "pretty smooth" as well. He was kind enough to leave the proof behind but took "the other" with him.

MACKENZIE KING SPEAKS OF VICTORY

People Showed themselves Sick of Coalitions—Gouin Speaks.

Ottawa, Ont. Dec. 7.—"The people, by their defeat of the Meighen administration, have shown that they agree with the attitude which the Liberals have been taking in the house and in the country during the last couple of years," declared Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, on receipt of approximately complete returns from the election at an early hour this morning.

"The people of Canada," Mr. King declared, "have shown by their overwhelming defeat of the Meighen administration that they realized the truth of the charges of autocracy and usurpation which I have been making against the Meighen government since Right Hon. Mr. Meighen took control of the affairs of the country."

"When the total Liberals and Progressives elected are considered, it must be admitted that the Meighen administration has been ignominiously defeated."

"The people have also shown that they are heartily sick of coalitions, and it is a matter of great satisfaction to me to find that the Liberal party is returned with a clear majority over both other groups in the House of Commons. It can carry on without any thought of coalition or log rolling with either group."

"The fact that three provinces, Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, have voted solidly for Liberals is in itself evidence that the Liberal policy has appealed not only to one class or group or race, but to all classes."

During the late night and early morning hours a flood of congratulatory telegrams poured into the office of the new premier-elect from all parts of the dominion. There were also a great many callers from among Ottawa Liberals, who desired to pay their respects and extend congratulations.

Sir Lomer Gouin.
Montreal, Dec. 7.—Sir Lomer Gouin, speaking last night after the announcement of his victory in Laurier-Outremont division, this city said: "I have fought the best fight I could, and I am deeply grateful to you electors and to the many who helped me in the campaign. I am more especially honored to be elected with such a majority in this, one of the largest divisions in Canada."

Mr. Ambrose Allain, senior proprietor of the Florence Hotel, first sighted the stranger the following morning when he appeared at the desk and enquired for mail. From this letter the stranger produced a cheque and inquired of Mr. Allain where he might cash it. Acting on the proprietor's suggestion that he try the Royal Bank, Mr. La Fortun shortly returned and, explaining that in order to obtain his objective he must secure identification, requested this favor of Mr. Allain. Not being acquainted with LaFortun, Mr. Allain discreetly side-tracked this suggestion. But Mr. La Fortun was not through yet. Whether or not this gentleman possessed that cultivated perpetuity and practical respectability of the professional

Mr. La Fortun to the point of climax. He now inquired for Mr. Bujold, the junior joint-owner of the Florence Hotel. With due solicitude for the convenience of his guest, Mr. Allain got into telephonic communication with his partner and gave him the story.

FORGETS NAMES OF HUSBANDS

Woman Has Fifteen Names But Remembers Name Only Eleven.

Chicago, Dec. 7.—Helen Ferguson Drexler of Waukegan, Ill., daughter of a Brooklyn family, who admits that she is a "nut on soldiers and sailors, but doesn't like marines," is in the county jail trying to recall the names of eleven of her fifteen husbands.

The government alleges that Mrs. Drexler, who has one child, has collected as high as \$400 a month in soldiers' allotment checks from the government for three years. The baby was listed as the child of each successive husband and drew an allotment, too.

In 1917, she says, she married Wilfred Taylor a soldier, and they had a son, now three years old. Next she married Paul Moler, a soldier; then Thomas Meehan, a sailor at Great Lakes and next Albert Drexler, a soldier at Camp Grant.

Although she has retained Drexler's name, there have been at least eleven husbands since, she figures. She never obtained a divorce from any of them, she says.

Government agents who arrested Mrs. Drexler say that she spent her spare time not needed to marry her husbands and collect allotment checks in traveling over the country at government expense evading Secret Service men who were on her trail.

An hour or so later La Fortun reappeared and made arrangements to be motored to Matapedia. The skillful recital of a story connected with his certain return that evening, enabled him to evade both hotel bill and car hire.
