Distribution of Seed Grain and Potatoes

From the Dominion Experimental Farms 1914-1915

By instructions of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution of superior sorts of grain and potatoes will be made during the coming winter and spring to Canadian farmers. The samples for general distribution will consist of Spring wheat (about 5 lbs.), white oats (about 4 lbs.), barley (about 5 lbs.), and field peas (about 5 lbs.). These will be sent out from Ottawa. A distribution of potatoes (in 3 lb. samples) will be carried on from several of the experimental farms, the Central Farm at Ottawa supplying only the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. All samples will be sent free by mail.

Applicants must give particulars in regard to the soil on their farms, and some account of their experience with such kinds of grain (or potatoes) as they have grown, so that a promising sort for their conditions may be selected.

Each application must be separate and must be signed by the applicant. Only one sample of grain and one of potatoes can be sent to each farm. If both samples are asked for in the same letter (only one will be sent. Applications on any kind of printed form cannot be accepted.

As the supply of seed is limited, farmers are advised to apply early, but the applications will not necessarily be filled in the exact order in which they are received. Preference will always be given to the most thoughtful and explicit requests. Applications received after the end of January will probably be too late.

All applications for grain (and applications from the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec for potatoes) should be addressed to the Dominion Cerealist, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Such applications require no postage. If otherwise addressed delay and disappointment may occur.

Applications for potatoes, from farmers in any other Province should be addressed (postage prepaid) to the Superintendent of the nearest Branch Experimental Farm in that Province.

## Rod and Gun for November

Bonnycastle Dale is the leading contributor to the November issue of Rod and Gun issued by W. J. Taylor, Limited, Woodstock, Ont., writing on the subject "Trapping in Ontario 1913-14." In "Wanderings in the Winter Woods" W. Dustin White describes vividly the joys of the winter camping trip. "Bear Trapping and Pack Carrying in B. C.," tells of a hunter who trapped a husky bear weighing some one hundred and sixty pounds and then carried him on his back for a distance of ten miles over an uneven woods trail. "Bite and Hec and Me" is a well written account of a canoe trip in the northern wilderness. The remainder of the magazine is replete with interesting articles and the various departments are well maintained.

## The Material Worth of the Body

The Paris Correspondent of the New York Sun in a recent communication takes up the value of human beings, computed on a purely physical basis, in the following manner: How much is the human body worth? The calculation is not difficult, and the answer is about eight dollars. The human body, a French scientist calculates, including skin, bones, flesh, nerves, blood, fat, and cartilage, is reduced by analysis to iron, salt, sugar, lime, phosphorus, magnesium, albumen, fatty substances and residues which can be used.

If this body weighs 150 pounds, as average weight, there would be enough by-products of the body to make an ordinary iron nail, enough salt to fill a table salt cellar, enough

sugar to fill a small sugar bowl, enough lime to whitewash a chicken coop, enough phosphorus to make a dozen matches, enough magnesium for one dose. The albuminoids obtained could be used by a trucker to replace the whites of a hundred eggs and there would be enough fat to fill a ten-pound pot.

Eight dollars, then is man's real worth, and there are many underfed and ill nourished men who would fall far short of the mark.

## Will Establish Field Hospital at Own Expense

Mrs. Henry Payne Whitney is also providing clothing for Three Thousand Persons.

NEW YORK, November 3.—Mrs. Henry Payne Whitney, who was Miss Gertrude Vanderbilt, will sail tomorrow for Europe on the Lusitania with a staff of four surgeons and fifteen trained nurses to establish at her own expense, a large field hospital behind the firing line in North

France. Ten motor ambulances, a large quantity of medical supplies and clothing sufficient for three thousand men, women and children, all purchased by Mrs. Whitney as a part of her undertaking, were shipped to France last Saturday on the steamship Chicago.

Wounded soldiers of the warring nations will be treated at the field hospital, which is to be conducted in co-operation with the American Ambulance Hospital.

Mrs. Whitney's sister, Countess Széchenyi, formerly Mrs. Gladys Vanderbilt, is now aiding the wounded in Austria.
