FOREIGN MISSION WORK OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCO-PAL CHURCH OF THE UNITED STATES.

Our Mission in Greece have twelve touchers, 14 students teachers and 396 pupils; no part of this mission to preach, but to teach; which it has done, as all reports show, with great виссевя.

Missions in Africa embrace one Bishop, 12 presbyters (only one white) 2 deacons, 10 candidates for orders, 15 postulants for orders, 15 lay roaders, 11 female teachers (only one white), 3 catechists and teachers, with two business agents.

Missions in China have one Bishop one resigned Bishop, 12 presbyters (seven of whom are white), 18 native dencons, 6 candidates for orders, 4 missionary physicians, 14 teachers, 4 medical students, 14 catechists, 65 teachers in college and day schools, and 12 nativo Bible women.

Japan missions embrace 1 Bishop, one resigned Bishop, 13 presbyters (one of whom is a Japanese) 6 deacons, all of whom are natives, 6 postulants, 9 missionary physicians, toachers and workers, 24 catechists, 33 teachers and Bible readers, 196, together with 27 others employed in mission work by Miss Perry and not paid for by our Board.

The work in Haiti has one Bishop, 9 prosbyters, 4 deacons, 2 postulants, 19 lay readors, 8 teachers and 10 Sunday school teachers.


Work in Mexico and Brazil is not included in this report. One cannot but fool gratified at the increase of all kinds of mission work and workors; yet with earnest prayer to Almighty God, .hrough Christ, for largor success,—until the knowledge of the Lord covers the earth as the waters do the sea .- Southern Churchman.

The summary of the above work is given in the Spirit of Missions as follows:

We have to-day in Africa, China, Japan and Haiti 225 stations and out stations and one mission school in Groceo. The whole number of laborors is 483, of whom three are Missionary Bishops and one is the Visionary Bishops and one is the Bishop of the Haitien Church, besides two Bishops who have resigned their jurisdictions, but still have connection with their respective fields; 75 are presbytors and deacons, of whom 58 are nativos of the countries in which they work, and who have been educated in our own mission schools. In China and Japan there are five missionary physicians. Including the wives of missionaries, who all participato in the work, there are 41 other foreign lay workers, and there aro 356 nativo catochists, lay readors, tonchors, etc. In 29 boarding schools, including the theological seminarios, and a medical school in China, there aro 766 pupils, and in 77 day schools thore are 2,906 more. These, with the Sunday scholars not otherwise counted, make a total of 5,223 childron under instruction. At the hos-

pitals and dispensaries in Wuchang, and Shanghai and vicinity in China. and at Osaka and Tokyo in Japan 23,083 individuals, who made 69,311 visits, came seeking relief from their bodily infirmities and were taught by the native clergy and catechists to look for spiritual benefit to the great Physician of souls. There were baptized during the year 1,095, and there are reported 3,901 commui-cants. There are thirty-six postu-lants and candidates for holy orders under training in the Hoffman Institute, Africa, in St. John's and St. Peter's Divinity schools, China, and in Trinity Divinity and Catechetical school, Japan. The whole of this work has been carried on at a cost to the Church, for the current expenses of the year just closed, of \$189,315. So far as reported, there has been contributed in the several fields toward their own support and "for the regions beyond," an aggregate of \$7,188,26.


