The money market to-day was nominally unchanged and very quiet. Seven per cent was the rate to good borrowers on both stock collateral and mercantile paper, the smaller operators and traders having to pay a higher rate.

The market for Sterling Exchange is dull. Bankers 60-day bills are negotiated at 8 7/16 and 8 1/2 to the public. Demand drafts are steady at 9 1/2 to 9 3/4 and currency in New York 5-16 to 9 premium.

The stock market following up the reaction of yesterday afternoon, was firmer again this morning, and parties who were raging "bears" yesterday were rampant "bulls" to-day. The brokers appear to control the situation more than ever, and are supposed to have secured a large proportion of the cheap stock thrown

overboard by their customers. At noon Montreal was 1 1/2 to 2 per cent higher at 206 1/2; 202 (ex-div); Toronto rose to 173; Mex. shares 1 1/4 to 1 1/2; 122 (ex-div); Omaha 1 1/4 to 1 1/2; Telegraph 3 to 123; Bichellen 24 to 73; City Passenger 2 to 123; Gas 4 to 179; and St. Paul and Manitoba 2 to 151.

In the local grain market Canada red winter wheat is quoted at \$1.02 to \$1.04, and white winter at \$1.01 to \$1.02. A choice lot of No. 1 Canada red winter was sold on p. 1. Fees are quiet at 90c to 91c; oats have been sold at 33c, and barley at 55c to 56c. A lot of Ontario barley was offered to city buyers today at 55c at point of shipment. Bye is nominally quoted at 60c to 62c. The flour market is very quiet, but steady. Sales were 100 extra at \$4.95, 250 Ontario bags (spring extra), without bag, at \$2.35. We quote prices of flour on this market as follows:—Superior extra, \$5 to 5.05; extra superfine, \$4.90 to 4.95; Canada strong bakers, \$5.50 to 6.25; spring extra, \$4.90 to 4.90; superfine, \$4.55 to 4.65; American strong bakers, \$6.75 to 7.25; fine, \$4.00 to 4.10; middlings, \$3.80 to 3.90; pollards, \$3.55; Ontario bags—medium to strong, \$2.40 to 2.50; spring extra, \$2.30 to 2.40; superfine, \$2.15 to 2.25; city bags (delivered), \$3.30 to 3.35.

A few jobbing sales of mess pork have occurred at quotations. A few lots of dressed hogs have lately been received here and sales have occurred at \$5.50 to \$5.75 per 100 lbs. Eggs are firm at 25c to 26c. Potatoes are selling slowly at \$5.35 to 5.45 per 100 lbs. In Chicago last night pork closed irregular at 15c to 20c blow top figures at \$17.65 January; \$17.72 February, which shows an advance of 15c to 17c from Saturday's closing. November pork, on the other hand, was 17c lower at \$13.32. Lard closed 12c to 27c higher than on Saturday at \$11.77 November, \$10.87 January, \$10.94 February.

We quote local provisions as follows:—Mess pork, western, per bbl, \$23.50 to \$24; mess beef, \$18 to \$19; hams, city cured, per lb, 16c to 16c; hams, canvassed, per lb, 16c to 17c; lard, in pails, per lb, 15c to 15c; bacon, per lb, 14c to 15c.

In Liverpool to-day lard rose 3d to 62s. The dairy produce market is steady for all grades, though the principal demand is for best qualities. Drockville butter has sold at 20c, and Morrisburg at 20c to 25c. Market here firmer. Steam refined oil held firm here at 77 1/2 to 80c. A sale of 50 bbls of God "A" Newfoundland was made at 67 1/2. A sale of 100 bbls of Gaspe God "A" was made at 65c. Hottel "A" held at 65c. God Liver, \$1.70 to 1.75; Olive, 75c to 80c; Palm Seed, 60c to 70c; Steam, 65c to 67c; Unrefined raw, 70c to 72c; kerosene, 72c to 74c.

HIDES AND SKINS.—There has been more improvement in trade at the slight concessions. We quote No 1 green 59, No 2 58, No 3 57. Western States hides are quoted at \$10 to \$10 25 for No 1, and \$8 25 to \$8 75 for No 2. Sheep and Lambskins are worth 75c to 85c. Calfskins, 14c per lb. Fish.—Dry cod is firm at \$6 25 to \$6 50. Green cod No 1 is scarce and selling at \$5 75 to \$6 and large draft at \$7. Labrador herrings now held at \$5. The bulk of the season's supply has arrived, and is below that of last year. Cape Breton, \$5 75 to \$6 per bbl. Canned fish steady. Mackerel in demand at \$1 10 per doz. Lobsters at \$1 12 to \$1 15, according to brand. Young's held firm at \$1 12 to \$1 15. Miramichi Packing Co., at \$1 12, now held at \$1 15. Little Lower, No 1 at \$2 1, No 2 at \$2 and No 3 at \$1 9 per bbl.

Wool.—In wool there is little or no change, the only transaction we hear of being that of 50,000 lbs. Caps on p. 1, but prices range from 17 1/2 to 20c. Domestic unchanged.
