

Question No. 261, by Mr. Herridge,—Order of the House for a Return showing: 1. What quantities, by grade, of coal were exported from Canada in 1960, 1961, and to date in 1962?

2. What quantities, by grade, of coal were available to coal dealers and consumers in British Columbia in 1960, 1961, and to date in 1962?

3. Have any complaints been received from coal dealers and consumers in B.C. with respect to difficulties in obtaining good furnace coal since January 1, 1960, and, if so, what action has been taken?

\*Question No. 264, by Mr. Rynard,—Order of the House for a Return showing: 1. When privately-owned radio stations are affiliated with a CBC network, can the CBC dictate the CBC programs such stations must carry, and can broadcasting licenses be cancelled for failure to comply with such instructions?

2. Have any religious programs on local private stations been replaced by sports and other secular programs as a result of such affiliation?

3. Has any long-standing 15-minute devotional program been cut to five minutes as a result of such affiliation?

Question No. 266, by Mr. Thompson,—Order of the House for a Return showing: 1. What have been the total exports of (a) wheat and wheat flour (b) all grains, from Canada during the periods 1952 to 1956, 1957 to 1961, and since January 1, 1962, in terms of both volume and dollar value?

2. During each of these periods, what quantity of grains (broken down as above) was exported to countries under Communist domination?

3. What was the value of such exports?

4. What is (a) the maximum amount of credit that has been advanced to finance such exports to countries under Communist domination (b) the present amount of credit outstanding in connection with such exports?

\*Question No. 267, by Mr. Howard,—Order of the House for a Return showing: Since January 1, 1957, has Interior Contracting Co. Ltd., of Penticton, B.C., received any money for any work done for the federal government and, if so, how much money by dates of payment and purpose?

Question No. 273, by Mr. Pickersgill,—Order of the House for a Return showing: 1. Has a slave-labour allowance been paid to the ex-prisoners of war captured at Hong Kong and, if not, is the payment of such an allowance under active consideration?

2. Has a benevolent fund been set up for ex-prisoners of war captured at Hong Kong from the War Claims Fund as recommended by the Veterans Affairs Committee of the House of Commons and, if not, why not?

3. What amount has been paid from the War Claims Fund to each approved claimant?

4. What claims are still outstanding, and what is the amount of each such claim?
