AUTOMOBILES—HIGHER CANADIAN PRICES— SUGGESTED MEETING BETWEEN PRIME MINISTER AND COMPANY HEADS TO EFFECT REDUCTION

Mr. Edward Broadbent (Oshawa-Whitby): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Prime Minister. In view of the fact North American automotive producers are making excess profits in Canada of about \$150 million as a result of charging Canadians on the average \$300 more for a car made in Canada than they do for the identical product in the United States, would the Prime Minister consider requesting that the heads of the North American auto companies in Canada meet with him next week with a view to effecting a meaningful reduction in prices to approximate or full parity with prices in the United States within a three-month period?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I would be very happy to draw this representation to the attention of the minister.

Mr. Broadbent: In view of the fact the Prime Minister indicated that no action is viewed seriously in this direction by his government, would he consider announcing or having the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce announce to the House within the next few days measures the government intends to take that would effectively reduce automotive prices and subsequently result in an increase in employment in that industry because the price of cars would then become closer to the price of foreign imports and thus lead to the creation of more jobs in this country? Does he intend to move in this direction at all?

Mr. Trudeau: Mr. Speaker, the premise of the question is false but as to the willingness of the minister to discuss this problem, he has constantly indicated to the House his willingness to do so.
