DEALINGS IN SHARES OF PETROFINA—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Ian Waddell (Vancouver-Kingsway): Madam Speaker, I rise under the provisions of Standing Order 43.

In view of the fact that Insiders Reports filed with the Ontario Securities Commission, dated January 23, 1981, show that four officers of Petrofina Incorporated sold shares and options over a short period in January of this year, resulting in a profit in excess of \$400,000, and in view of the fact that one officer in particular purchased 1,000 shares on January 16 for
