

Instances referred to on the back of the work
herewith in which Justice elsewhere caused
money, that from men in the U.S. had been
Confiscated by those in lands so far away
that it appeared that it could not be brought
to be returned, referred to on the back
of the work, are these:

Before the San Francisco 1906 earthquake
a man asked a prominent lawyer there as
to money that was his, in the hands of an-
other in a British Country, that he had been
unable to get from him. He was told
that so long had the holder had it that the
Statute of Limitations would operate and
so far away was he across the Atlantic that
he considered there was not law under
which he could obtain it.

A friend then told him - naming the
writer - that there was one through whom it
was believed that if through any one, his money
kept from him, could be brought to be re-
turned.

Not long after, after procuring knowledge
through what ones to deal, after having
placed the matter before them in the way
that the writer did, through lawyers of
Great Britain a large portion of the mans
money was caused to be returned to him.

So, not long after the San Francisco Earth-
quake of 1906 to another man of the U.S.
was money belonging to him, after the
writer had written to lawyers of another
British land, in the way that he did,
because of what in that land with or without
compensation he had seen men ready
to slave, caused by them to be re-
turned to him.
