

PROF. LOCKHART: I think it is more feasible.  
of districts in this Province that some of us would

not like to live in. Now, you get girls coming from  
those districts, and they put on a considerable amount

of culture when they come to us, and they will go  
back to those places; whereas if you take a girl from  
a centre, it is difficult to get her to go out there.

THE PRINCIPAL: Perhaps recommendations 143 and 144,  
and the hope expressed in recommendation 145, could  
best be met insofar as certain districts in the

Province are concerned by insisting more upon the  
summer school?

PROF. LOCKHART: A broader summer school than we have.  
We can easily supply the school if someone will  
supply the money.

THE PRINCIPAL: You think that would be the cheap-  
est way?

PROF. LOCKHART: Yes.

THE PRINCIPAL: And perhaps as effective a way as that  
suggested in recommendations 143 and 144?

PROF. LOCKHART: In many respects. We have many who  
come back in the Fall and when they come back, they  
reap almost as much benefit as they do in six months.

DEAN LEMESSURIER: I take it we need a higher matricul-  
ation for the summer school.
