longs for a closer intimacy with that Spirit which seems to pervade everything, and create so much that is wonderful and beautiful.

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The lake is from one to two miles wide on an average, and is thirty miles long, reaching from the village of Newport, in Vermont, on the south, to Magog, a Canadian hamlet, on the north. Full two-thirds of the lake is in Canada, and the boundary line is easily distinguished-south of it there being more thrift and enterprise than is seen just north over the line in Canada. The water in most places is very deep and cold, and is just the place for the lake trout which are caught each year ingreat abundance. On the east shore of the lake are the summer cottages of some of the wealthiest people in Montreal, who always spend the warm season here. Among those who own cottages are Judge Day, Mr. Molson, the Montreal banker, and Hugh Allan, President of the Montreal and Liverpool Steamship Company. The latter owns a steam yacht in

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
