privilege. He read from Hansard some observations delivered by Col. Hughes in the house last Monday, which were in substance to the effect that Hon. Sydney Fisher, then minister of agriculture, and certain Liberal members of the house at that time had unloaded upon the western

men the land now occupied by the Farnham camp in the eastern townships. Col. Hughes went on to say that the militia department had loaned money upon land supposed to be available for growing tobacco, that the land, which was a mere morass, turned out to have no value, and that they had produced a loss of \$100,000, at least of saving their investment by inducing the militia department to buy the land for the purpose of a cash crop.

Speaker Sprague interrupted Mr. Devin to rule that no question of privilege was involved.

**False and Columnious.**

Mr. Devin submitted that he was quite correct. He proceeded to read from the publication of the Hon. Sydney Fisher, and said that the minister of militia and defense had given

information to the house. He was seen by the prime minister, the minister of justice, the minister of trade and commerce (Mr. Fisher), and his colleagues, and that he had made a statement on an honorable gentleman which upon investigation he would find to be correct.

Mr. Speaker Sproule again called Mr. Devlin to order. He pointed out that Mr. Fisher was not a member of the House, and that the remarks of the Minister were not directed against any member.

Moreover, if the statements made by the minister of militia were untrue, they could only be shown by the evidence of people in the house, which would be clearly inadmissible.

**Mr. Laurier's Protest.**

Mr. Devlin said it was customary for a lady

Mr. Speaker: "I know what you are getting at because I have been here last Monday and I hold that it is not proper to go on."

Sir Wilfred: "I rose to protest."

The member for Wright (Mr. Devlin): "I am not a question of privilege. Surely Mr. Speaker is not busy rushing him out of order before he can state what the question of privilege was."

Mr. Speaker then re-stated his ruling.

Mr. Lauder: "I am not a question of privilege. I am assuming that you know your own mind of the member. Will you not permit me to state what the question of privilege is which he desires to press."

**Appealed From Ruling.**

Mr. Speaker: "I rule that he cannot proceed. I am not a question of privilege. He has said that there is a question of privilege."

Mr. Lauder: "And you refuse to permit the member to finish his case?"

Mr. Speaker: "Yes, I rule that I would not be bound by your decision."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "Then, sir, I appeal to your decision."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "I have been greeted with tumultuous cheers by the members of the opposition. Mr. Speaker also reduced to writing and read out the question of privilege to be voted upon. He said that he was not involved in the question of privilege, but that he was a member of the House, and that he was not a member of the House."

**Howled Meighen Down.**

At this point, Solicitor General Meighen began to raise his voice and to howl down Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He was howled down by the opposition.

Mr. Carvell (Carleton, N.B.) cried out "The House is not a court of law. The House of Commons can take care of himself."

Mr. Speaker Spruille called for order and said that he was not a member of the House, and that he was not a member of the House. He would adhere to his ruling.

**Col. Hughes' Challenged Hughes.**

**Col. Hughes: "No."**

There was applause from the government benches accompanied by hoots and jeers from the opposition.
