SPORT GOSSIP.

The present form of baseball contract which major league players are signing contains no "reserve clause." There is no "option clause," either, but there's a provision that the player "must abide by the rules of the National Commission." Inis means that the "reserve list," when compiled by the commission, after consultation with the major league clubs, will prevent players from leaving their present employers under the rules of organized baseball. In the opinion of lawyers this form of contract would not stand a test in the courts in the event of a baseball war, for there is no legal restraint placed upon the player's services. Just why the "reserve clause" has been eliminated is not made clear.
