

## ONCE A BIG GAMBLER BROKE AND DYING NOW

**Jimmy Wakely, Who Was John L. Sullivan's Backer and a Power Among New York Police, at One Time the Best Known Sporting Man in America, Dying in New York.**

NEW YORK, July 14.—Jimmy Wakely has his chips stacked in front of him getting ready to cash in. He has been playing the game a long time. His luck has been good and bad, and it's his double-edged sword that the worst luck should have come just as he was thinking about laying down his cards and preparing to play another kind of game.

Wakely is dying and he's dying broke. His bank roll ran into the hundreds of thousands once, but a few years ago it had grown so slim that he could not keep his saloon from being taken away from him on a foreclosed mortgage. It's the way of the game and Wakely knew it.

He had staked too many of the down and out who once had been up and in not to realize the chances he was taking. But with that curious confidence that so many gamblers have, he always felt that fate would pass him by—others might be given the gate, but he would be left in the centre of the ring. But now he is broke and dying.

Was Sullivan's Backer. Jimmy Wakely is still among those who can be called well known. Ten years ago he was better known. Twenty years ago he was the best known sporting man in America. He was the banker and manager of John L. Sullivan.

Wakely overlooked no bets in the fields in which he was active. As a "sporting man," he never lost a case by keeping a saloon, owning race horses, running a poolroom, promoting prize fights, capping for gambling houses and all the other things that are countenanced by the sporting code of ethics—even those things well past the shade line.

Wakely is sixty years old. He has aged rapidly the last few years. His hair kept time with his bank account—they both grew thin together. When they took his saloon away from him he lost much of his spirit.

Wakely was always a bit of a philosopher in the old days. He had a wise

saw or an adage for every occasion. "It all breaks even," he used to say, paraphrasing another philosopher named Emerson, when fortune was most unkind.

Things did break even and a little better than even for Wakely for many years in New York. Then came the inevitable compensation. For years he was a power in the police "system" in New York. His Say About "Protection." Wakely used to have a large say as to who should get protection and who should be raided regularly. His friends

More Markers Than Roche. Wakely's friends say that he has markers for over \$300,000 due him—unpaid debts by those he lent money to or gave gambling credit to.

Was in Toronto. Wakely moved to Forty-third-street and Sixth-avenue years ago. The move hurt him. From his business went to worse. Presently he even lost the patronage of the nightclubs, and when they left all that could be seen in the place was the bartender and the crackerbox.

Then the brewery took this place away from him. He really broke the old man's heart. Since then he has been doing the best he could—an expression that has a meaning all its own on Broadway—and it has not been very good. He has been living at No. 108 West Fourth-street. An eighteen-year-old daughter lives there with him.

Wakely is well-known in Toronto. When the articles for the fight between Sullivan and Jake Kilrain were signed, Wakely stayed at the old Rose-sin House, and became well acquainted with the sporting fraternity here.

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NEW FREIGHTER  
ARRIVED HERE

Easton, Owned by J. T.  
Mathews, Entered Harbor  
Sunday—To Run From  
Montreal to Port Arthur

Fresh from her stocks at Sunderland,  
Eng., and after stormy trip over the  
Atlantic, the new freighter, "Easton,"  
reached Toronto harbor yesterday  
morning. The boat, which is of the  
most modern type, is the property of  
J. T. Mathews of this city. Of the  
most improved steel construction its  
length is 250 feet, while in width it  
measures 42 feet. It has a depth of  
18 feet. The steamer cost \$150,000, and  
was built by the Sunderland Ship-  
building Co. in the City of Sunderland,  
Eng.

The new freighter will undertake a  
general carrying business between  
Montreal and Port Arthur. It has a  
gross tonnage of 1757. It is propelled  
by engines of 100 horse-power, and has  
a steam steering gear. The boat is  
lighted by electricity throughout. The  
inside fittings are of the most up-to-date  
type, and the interior decorations are  
of polished mahogany.

The "Easton" was 16 days on the  
trip. For two days the boat was in the  
ice in Belle Isle, and met with  
some bad weather, which it stood well.  
Captain Holloway and a salt water  
crew brought her to Montreal, where  
she was taken in charge by Captain  
Delaney of St. Catharines, and a crew  
of fresh water rats. The Scotch en-  
gineers, who brought the boat out, may  
remain with the craft.
