"At dusk hostile infantry left their trenches to attack northwest of Albert, but met with heavy rifle and machine gun fire, and were driven back.

Strong hostile attacks developed also late in the evening in the neighborhood of Dranoutre, and were repulsed by French troops after sharp fighting French and British artillery inflicted severe losses on the enemy.

"During the night the activity of the enemy's artillery continued, and at an early hour this morning a heavy bombardment was opened along practically the whole British front from north of Albert to our junction with the French south of the Somme.
