Further Returns Only Add to Triumphs of The Opposition Party.

St. Petersburg, April 9.-Belated returns to-day only increased the magnitude of the opposition's victory. The City of Moscow has returned 160 electors, all Constitutional Democrats. Kursk returned a solid Progressive delegation, headed by Prince Peter Dolgoroukoff. M. Sherkoff, one of the members elected to the lower house of parliament, is now in prison. Vitebsk elected two Poles, one a Catholic priest, and one a Progressive; two Constitutional Democrats and two peasants. Vladimir, one of the old capitals of Russia, where the orthodox faith is particularly strong, chose a Monarchist, but the electoral college elected five Constitutional delegates.

Tula is the only province, except Moscow, which elected a majority of Conservatives. The result in Moscow Province constitutes an anomaly in the elections. All the Constitutional Democrats went down, but the result was engineered thru a deal with the Reactionists and a portion of the October ists, who bought the support of the peasants in the electoral college by al-allowing them to name an additional The bargain was so distasteful to M. Shipoff, the prominent Zemstvo leader, and M. Chetverikoff, that they declined to be parties to it, withdrew their candidatures and also induced the Constitutional Democrats to withdraw their ticket, which included Prince Paul Dolgoroukoff, Brince Galit-zinin, M. Kokeshkine, Prof. Mouromtzeff, and M. Golovin Heart Disease.

As a result, the Province of Mosow, the real heart of Russia, sends to parliament comparatively unknown nen-two peasants, a workman, Prince Gagarin, M. Bashoff, M. Krudner and Peter Struve. The latter is the most minent, being the president of the Moscow Bourse. With the single exception of Tula, in every province where the peasant class was in the majority the electoral college captured the majority of the members. Most of them, however, altho belonging to the peasant class, are actually pea-sants in name only, and have risen far above their station. For instance a peasant of St. Petersburg Province

is a principal of a middle school.

The Rech organ of the Constitution al Democrats terms it a splendid victory, and, referring to the election of men like M. Petrunkevitch and M. Boditcheff, who first demanded a constitution for Russia, and Prince Shakoy-ski, who gave a fortune to aid the liberation movement, the paper points out that these are "the very people whose ideas the emperor twelve years ago called foolish dreams."

A Warning. The Rech then issues a solemn warning, as follows:
"If Count Witte last November had

been able to feel the beating of the heart of Russia and had listened to the of M. Petrunkevitch, the world would not have witnessed the horrors of the present counter-revolution. The voice of the people becomes clearer and louder daily. If the government es not listen to it the country is destined to pass thru a cataclysm a hundredfold worse than anything which has transpired."

The Twentieth Century, formerly The Russ, declares that the election proves the strength of the opposition to the government from Finland to the Caucasus, adding:

When we recall the police preparations at the first stage of the elections, how many of the original electors orna nent the prisons, and that the elections were held virtually under the regime of martial law, the result is all the more remarkable. The Novoe Vremya last week said that St. Petersburg was only a dot on the map of Russia. What will it say now? Can it doubt the government will not have an obedient parliament?"



A REAL ESTATE DEAL.

Finds Its Way Into Supreme Court -Aylesworth One of Counsel.

Ottawa, April 9.-The case of Gilnour v. Simon was argued in the supreme court to-day.

The appellant sued for specific performance of an agreement by ondent to sell land. The alleged agreement was made thru a real estate broker, who testified on the trial that the respondent had authorized him to sell for a price per acre and on specific terms; that the appellant agreed to the terms, and gave a deposit on account, whereupon the respondent varied the terms by demanding a lump sum in place of a sum per acre, which was agreed to. The respondent's evidence contradicted that of the broker, and showed no com-

pleted agreement. The trial judge directed an order for performance, stating that he believed the broker, and attached no credit to the testimony of the respondent.
The divisional court reversed his judgment, holding that the broker.
