CANADIAN BUDGE MAGISTRATE BELIEVES O'NEARA THE MAN

Resists All Mr. Curry's Pleading and Argument for Granting of Bail.

John O'Neara, charged with perjury in the London bribery cases, was yesterday committed for trial on the evidence already submitted.

Magistrate Denison would not accept bail despite a long argument put up by the prisoner's counsel, J. W. Curry, K.C., who will make application this morning at the County Court before a high court judge.

When the case was called, Mr. DuVerne said that the prisoner's father was the Canadian store owner in London, Ontario, who was arrested here.

"I am only waiting for other witnesses on your account, Mr. Curry," said the magistrate. "You said you wanted all the evidence. There is now enough evidence to commit the man."

"It is most important in a case like this that the prisoner should give evidence to get out and see people in Brantford, who saw the man who was arrested here. I don't know how many witnesses you have, but I think most people, in fact, nine cases out of ten, would not remember," said the magistrate.

"I may say that I have been in the office of the man, in fact, I am satisfied that is the man at least I think that's the man."

"I would like you to weigh the evidence of this man before me, how can I get evidence in Brantford? It would be necessary for me to take him to Brantford."

"The man is guilty and I won't grant bail," interrupted the magistrate.

"Well, have you a right to take away my right to get evidence?" asked the prisoner's counsel.

"I can't lay it before me, the other court. I told you some time ago what I was going to do. You can apply to the other court. The man ran away and the charge is still pending," added Mr. DuVerne.

"I don't believe the witnesses," hinted the magistrate.

"All right, I'll commit O'Neara. Call the next case," said his worship, cutting out further argument.

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A CHURCH FOR THE CHINESE

Presbyterians May Establish One for Mission Work in Toronto.

At the quarterly meeting of the Presbyterian Church last night, the chairman, Rev. A. B. Winchester, pointed out that the work of the teachers in their labor with the Chinese in this city had been of the best, but that the classes all over the city were dwindling down.

One reason for this was the fact that the Chinese came to the Sunday school with the idea to learn English, and, secondly, to enjoy a certain sociality. A Reform Society organized by the foreigners themselves has been the chief cause for the fall in attendance.

The Chinese had mastered the language and were now receiving the social element side of the problem of this affair of their own.

Dr. Winchester believed that in view of these facts the time had come when the church should take steps to organize and maintain an exclusive church for the Chinese of Toronto, where they could hear the Gospel expounded in their own language and would not have to be running around to different churches.

David White thought the matter should be inter-denominational, but Dr. Winchester thought that the work had been practically established by the Presbyterian Church and should, therefore, remain under the wing of that denomination.

The matter was left in abeyance until the visit of the superintendent of China missions in Canada, Dr. Thompson of Toronto, who will address a meeting of the teachers on this subject before the New Year.

FELL FROM A CAR.

Thos. O'Grady, Aged 55, Breaks His Leg Getting off Trolley.

Last night about 7 o'clock Thomas O'Grady, 355 Ontario-street, stepped off a moving car at Gerrard and Sherbourne-streets. He was thrown to the pavement, sustaining a fracture of the right leg near the thigh. His right cheek and hand were badly bruised. He was carried into Dr. Cameron's and attended to by Dr. Anderson and subsequently taken by P.C. McNeil (64) in the police ambulance to St. Michael's. Mr. O'Grady is about 55 years of age.
