A petition of the Suffrage Association is being very widely circulated just now among the more liberal-minded of our citizens. It is intended for presentation at the parliament buildings at no very distant date. Its wording runs as follows: To the Honorable the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario in parliament assembled.

That whereas all just government derives its power from the consent of the governed. And whereas woman is subject to all the laws of the land, being punishable for crime, paying taxes on property and taking her part in the commercial and economic structure.

Therefore, resolved, that woman should have the full franchise extended to her on the same basis as that of man.

Nothing But Prosperity In the North of Ireland

One in Every Eight Has Bank Account With Average Deposit of \$100—Development of Industrial Co-Operation.

(Special Correspondence of The Toronto World). BELFAST, Sept. 18.—Whatever may be the case in other parts of Ireland, in the north one sees nothing but prosperity, and the rest of the country, if stories are true, is not far behind.

The postoffice savings accounts for the 12 months past, for example, indicate a condition far from "distressful."

The number of depositors during that time was 506,426, and their total deposits \$10,550,015, or over 50 million dollars. One in every eight of the population, therefore, has a bank account, with an average deposit of \$20 in 12 months.

In Scotland the average deposit per person is \$12 1/2, and in England \$14 1/2. So the Irishman proves to be more thrifty also than his fellow islanders. And still there are beggars in Ireland, and the rest of the world.

It is plain and bitterness to some Irishmen to hear of prosperity in Ireland, and the possible disappearance of their grievances of poverty and privation constitutes for them a grievance not to be contemplated without indignation.

This side of the "Irish question" is whatever the cause, it indicates a boundary line that the tremendous advances of the last 10 or 20 years have made, and so many real grievances have been removed or abated.

The whole country feels the touch of the new method and, of course, the co-operative system is not confined to dairying. Its application to banking and credit societies has been equally remarkable and successful, and there has never been a loss in the business so far. Honest, steady, faithfully repaid every penny advanced to him for stocking his little farm or making such improvements as came under the scheme. The ability to cash for needed implements has saved preposterous profits from the middleman, who is the chief complainant against the new era.

There has been no period within the memory of man, says Secretary Anderson, when the industrial spirit of the people has been so thoroughly awakened.

The work of co-operation in Ireland has begun at the roots of society, among the people themselves. The spirit so inculcated and spread abroad has been trusted to have its influence in still wider measure, and those who can meet together for mutual advantage in business may ere long find fully applicable to other problems.
