

RACING BOARD BULLETIN

ANOTHER LOT OF RIDERS DECLARED PROFESSIONALS

Wholesomeness Suspended for Competing in Unsanctioned Races on the Holiday - New Officials Appointed - Sanctions Issued - General Official News of Racing Cyclists.

Chairman George H. Orr of the O.W.A. Racing Board has issued his regular weekly bulletin, dated May 28, 1896, which reads as follows:

Sanctions issued: July 1, Prentice Bory, Charlotteville Bicycle Club.

The following riders are declared professional bicycle riders: Harley Davidson, class B; J. A. Harley, Patrols, class B; Fred Westbrock, Brantford, under class B; John Davidson, Brantford, under class B; Joseph Simpson, St. Stephen, N.B., is pending an investigation as to his amateur standing.

W. J. Cameron of Port Elgin is added to District Racing Board No. 4. A. Bergala, Toronto, and H. Gibbons, Toronto, are declared amateur bicycle riders.

The Wingham Turf Club track is placed on records as accepted track. L. H. Dell, Calgary, E. R. Ferguson, Regina, and G. A. Lunn, Medicine Hat, are appointed official timers for N.W.T. District.

H. F. Carman, Morrisburg, is permitted to ride in amateur races in the United States on May 30.

For competing in unsanctioned races on May 28, Joe Brooks, Fred Dayton and H. Weir are suspended till June 29.

THE BUFFALO RACE TO-DAY. Buffalo, May 29. The handicaps for tomorrow's Buffalo race are out. There are 17 entries for the two-mile professional race.

The Cooper and McLeod professional race, 200 yards, has the same number of entries. In the mile open there are 13 entries.

The St. Albans Bicycle Club will leave for a club house Sunday, May 31, at 1:30 a.m. for a church on St. Andrew's Church, Okaville.

The tourists will hold a matinee on Saturday, June 6, at Exhibition Park, consisting of four races, both scratch and handicap, and will be given. Entries close at 10 o'clock.

NEW BAGGAGE REGULATIONS.

Henceforth Method Must be Observed in Shipping Camp Equipments. Superintendent Generally of the Union Depot has issued the following instructions for the regulation of baggage shipment:

All commercial baggage, camping equipment and baggage generally used at summer resorts to be received at the Station-street baggage room from 6:30 to 9 o'clock. On Sundays all baggage is to be checked at Station-street. In order to reach any particular train from Front-street baggage must be checked ten minutes before the train is due to leave.

Wagon loads of camping equipment for summer resorts should be brought to the foot of Station-street and received on the platform there.

Grain Barge Lost in the St. Lawrence—The Ashore and Afloat.

There was but little abatement of the wind yesterday, and again the schooners and smaller boats had to keep within the shelter of the harbor.

The Macassa, Empress, Lakeside and Chloora made their regular trips, but the prospect of a gale was not alluring enough to induce many passengers to take the steamboat routes, and there were few on board.

The steamer Ocean will leave to-morrow afternoon for Montreal, with passengers and freight.

The continued coolness does not add to the ferry company's earnings, but the inland service is well patronized by residents. The new inland band will give two concerts on Saturday afternoon and evening, if the weather is at all favorable.

On Tuesday morning next the Empress will bring over from Buffalo the Boston Festival Chorus and Orchestra, and after the performance of that evening, in Massey Hall, will return with the performers to Rochester.

A Kingston dispatch says the barge Joseph Arthur R. with 17,000 bushels of grain, in tow of the tug Reginald, struck a rock in the Galop Rapids, struck the bottom in 13 feet of water. Cargo and freight were insured, but the boat was not protected.

Advices from Leamington say the tug Lorman, towing a raft of logs, was driven ashore yesterday afternoon off Point Pelee. The crew were with difficulty rescued from the wreck. The tow is all afloat on the lake.

Several coal schooners arrived during the night.

SAWMILL GOES UP IN SMOKE. Operated by Klock & Co. of Klock's Mills—Seventy-Five Men Out.

Aylmer, Que., May 29.—The Lindsay sawmill here which was leased and operated by R. H. Klock & Co., of Dock Mills, Ont., was destroyed this morning by fire. The alarm was rung at 2 o'clock, and the fire brigade was on hand a few minutes later, but the fire had by that time made such headway that it was impossible to save the building.

The fire was discovered by the nightwatchman on his return from a visit to the piling ground, between the engine room and the wall of the small building enclosing it. The destruction of this mill will be a great misfortune to Aylmer, as it will throw some 75 men out of work. It is said the building was partly covered by insurance, but the details cannot be ascertained as yet.


