Rev. Dr. Potts, in opening the educational meeting in the evening, mentioned the fact that sermons on educational matters were required as part of the students' course at Victoria College. Prizes were given for the two best sermons.

H. H. Fulger, who was introduced as a representative layman, took the place of Chester D. Massey, who was unable to be present. There was, he said, a tendency to do the easy thing and to leave the difficult. There was a tendency on the part of ministers to indulge in evangelistic and missionary work, while educational work was hardly touched. People were not interested in education and the ministers did not force it upon them. He paid a tribute to those who by the generous disbursement of their estates had placed Victoria College in its present position. But the financial problem concerning it could only be solved by popular beneficence. Statistics showed 10 cents per member to be the amount given to educational needs. The country was never more prosperous, and there was no reason why this should not be \$1, except that ministers failed to make the proper connection between the source of wealth and the educational needs of the people. He hoped the revival at the Wesley B. Centenary would show itself along educational lines.
