"AN ONLY SURVIVOR'S" STORY.
San Francisco, May 23.—The reported
loss of five whaling vessels is given
little credence among mariners. The
reason is that vessels in the vicinity
of Port Barrow are safe until they be-
gin to break up, which rarely oc-
curs before the 1st of June. Regarding
the whaler Alexander, it is only
ten days ago that she was reported as
having reached Port Barrow. She
could not be much further north than
that point at this time.

EXPEDITION FROM CADIZ.
New York, May 23.—A dispatch to
the World from Cadiz says: It is
stated here positively that the Pe-
layo, Carlos IV., three of the trans-Atlantic
steamers and torpedo boats are about
to sail for the Philippines.

The Pe-
layo is a well armed, armored
and manned. The Carlos IV. is well
armed and manned and has good guns,
but her heavy ones forward will not
swing, owing to defects in the ma-
chinery, and can only be fired directly
ahead.

The captains of these boats are good
men and experienced, but Admiral
Cervera is regarded by naval men as
difficult to work with, giving orders
and contradicting them in almost the
same breath.

Gibraltar, May 13.—An unconfirmed
report is in circulation here that the
Spanish squadron at Cadiz is about to
sail for Cuban waters.

There Was Firing
On Sunday!

Rumors That the Spanish Were
Badly Beaten.

Invasion of Cuba Expected
Within Seven Days.

Sampson's and Dewey's Fleets
Greatly Reinforced.

Claim To Be Able to Beat Anything
Spain Can Collect—110,000 Volun-
teers Mustered In—Looking for
Cervera.

FIRING ON SUNDAY

New York, May 23.—Specials to the
World and Journal from Hayti report
there was heavy cannonading off Port
de Paix and Gonaves. Rumors are
current that the Spaniards were disas-
trously beaten. The firing took place
at both points simultaneously, about 6
a.m. on Sunday.

A cable to the World from Port-au-
Prince says: Heavy cannonading was
reported today from Port de Paix and
Gonaves. It is supposed that the naval
engagement has been fought. Rumors
are current that the Spaniards were de-
feated disastrously.

Port de Paix reports that the firing
was heard for a considerable time early
this morning.

Gonaves reports that the cannonad-
ing was heavy between the Mole St.
Nicolas, on the west coast of Hayti,
and Port de Paix. It was heard at 6
a.m., and lasted an hour.

Telegraphic communication with
Gonaves was interrupted until 3:30 p.
m. Communication between Mole St.
Nicolas and Port de Paix is still inter-
rupted.

New York, May 23.—A dispatch to the
Herald from Mole St. Nicolas, Hayti,
says numerous and very frequent re-
ports, resembling cannonading, which
were heard in the Windward Passage
on Friday afternoon and Saturday
morning. The reports were of a nature
to lead to the belief that a naval en-
gagement was in progress between the
squadrons of the United States and
Spain. No man-of-war has been seen
outside the harbor, however, and none
to learn whether or not a naval battle
actually took place.

THE RUMORS FROM ST. NICOLAS
DENIED.

Washington, May 23.—The rumors of
a great naval battle current Saturday
night, were disposed of by the navy
department in the following bulletin:
No truth in the published statement
concerning the engagement off Mole St.
Nicolas, Hayti, in which twelve ships
were sunk.

INVASION OF CUBA.
No possible contingency can now
arise, according to the war department
officials, to prevent an invasion of
Cuba during the present week. Those
in direct control of affairs insist that
the conditions will have to be ig-
nored, and they can see no reason for
further delay.

THE OREGON'S GREAT RECORD.
Washington, May 23.—The navy de-
partment is proud of the record made
by Oregon from an engineering
point of view. The reports to the de-
partment from the ship show that she
does not need 5 cents' worth of re-
pairs to her machinery after her 13,000
miles' continuous run. The record is
said never to have been equaled since
the building of the first iron warship.

REINFORCED FLEETS.
Admiral Cervera's action in permit-
ting the battleship Oregon to join the
Rear Admiral Sampson's squadron
without attempting her destruction
was a great deal of curiosity
to the navy department. It was
his plan of campaign really is. But
there is no longer any fear regarding
the Oregon. She is in the danger
zone, and will put into Key West for
coal, when she will hasten to join
Rear Admiral Sampson's fleet.

With the Oregon attached to the
north Atlantic squadron we shall have
on hand a force which can defeat the
entire Spanish naval force in the At-
lantic Ocean.

While the Monterey has been ordered
to proceed to Manila, it does not ne-
cessarily follow that the authorities
have confirmed information of the
reports for the Philippines. As a matter
of fact, the dispatch of the Monterey
is in the nature of a precaution. With
the five protected cruisers and three
gunboats, Rear Admiral Dewey will be
able to defeat any force that Spain
may collect and send against him. The
authorities do not believe that Spain
will send her home squadron to the
Philippines.

LET THEM ALONE.
Washington, May 23.—The Army and
Navy Journal protests against the in-
terference of the navy department
with the movements of Sampson and
Schley. It says: "If Wm. T. Samp-
son and Winfield Scott Schley are not
competent to command, let them be
relieved without further delay, and
other officers assigned to command their
ships. If they are competent, they
should be given full liberty of action
without interference from war boards
or paper strategists. If the gentlemen
have shown what can be accomplished
in command of the fleets and place the
responsibility on them, Admiral Dewey
has shown what can be accomplished
by bold and independent action. Does

The City Teachers

Hold Their Association Meeting
at the Collegiate Institute.

Rev. Mr. Moorhouse Condemns Cram-
ming—An Interesting Programme.

The London Teachers' Association
met in session in the Collegiate Insti-
tute this morning at 10 o'clock. Rev.
Mr. Moorhouse conducted the opening
exercises, and in the course of a few
remarks said that one danger that
might befall the teachers was getting
away from the practical side of human
nature. He also condemned the
cramming system, and congratulated
the board on its efforts to provide more
accommodation by the new addition.
"We should endeavor to inculcate love
and duty. The Bible should be more
used in our schools than at present." The
speaker closed by wishing the
teachers God-speed in their work.

President Althouse addressed the as-
sociation briefly, welcoming the teach-
ers, and saying he was pleased at the
good attendance. The reading of the
list of delinquents was laid over till
the afternoon session.

Mr. Althouse and Miss Johnson gave
very interesting and exhaustive reports
of the Ontario educational system.
Miss Laidlaw then gave an interesting
outline of the discussion in the kinder-
garden department.

On motion of Mrs. Gahan, seconded
by Mr. Kirk, the reports of delegates
were adopted, and a vote of thanks
tendered them.

Mr. Davidson followed with an inter-
esting paper on "Drawing." He said
that the books were not at all
satisfactory. We ought to have a text
book containing copies of drawings
which are made with pen or pencil.
Mr. Davidson illustrated his nature
profusely. The drawings were made on
wood from subjects. The address was
extremely interesting and beneficial.
A number of the teachers took part in
the discussion.

Mr. Gray moved a resolution to ap-
point a committee to look into the ad-
visability of dividing the association
into grades. Carried.

The election of officers and other
business takes place at this afternoon's
session.
