THE DAYS OF LENT

Regulations of the Roman Catholic Church for the Diocese of London.

Lenten regulations for the Diocese of London have just been issued by the Roman Catholic Church, as follows: 1. All days of Lent, Sundays except-

ed, are fast days. 2. By a special indult from the holy see, A. D. 1884, meat is allowed on Sundays at every meal, and at one meal on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, except the Saturday of Em-

ber week and Holy Saturday. 3. The use of flesh and fish at the same time is not allowed in Lent. The following persons are exempted from abstinence, viz.: Children under years; and from fasting, persons under 21: and from either or both, those who, on account of ill-health, advanced age, hard labor, or some other legitimate cause, cannot observe the law.

Besides the public devotions, family prayers, espe-cially the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin, should be recited in every Catholic household of the diocese,
