41,000 CANADIAN LIVES HAVE BEEN LAID DOWN IN THE CAUSE OF FREEDOM

OTTAWA, April 19.-In the course
of his address on the order-in-
council to amend the military ser-
vice act, Premier Borden gave
figures, compiled up to March 31,
1918, regarding Canada's war effort.
He said that up to that date
Canada had dispatched overseas
364,700 men of all ranks; of these
348,000 were non-commissioned
officers and men and 16,700
officers. A table of mili-
tary districts showed that the
men had been recruited as follows:
Military District No. 1 (Ontario),
25,532; No. 2 (Toronto), 76,597; No.
3 (Kingston), 39,393; No. 4 (Mon-
treal), 32,443; No. 5 (Quebec), 8,
380; No. 6 and 7 (Maritime Pro-
vinces), 37,305; No. 8 and 12 (British
Columbia and Saskatchewan), 75,033;
No. 11 (British Columbia), 36,475;
No. 12 (Alberta), 35,333.

Canadian casualties so far, said
the prime minister, were as fol-
lows: Killed in action, 25,347; died
of wounds, 8,671; died of disease, 1,356;
wounded, 106,185; prisoners of war
2,706; presumed dead, 3,393; other
casualties, 790.

41,000 Canadian Lives.
A compilation of those killed in

action, died of wounds and disease,
presumed dead and missing, said
Sir Robert, would show that a total
of about 41,000 young Canadians had
given up their lives in the war up
to March 31 last.

Sir Robert said that while he was
not at liberty to tell the House just
where the Canadians are located, he
could say that the forces repre-
senting the Dominion are in great-
er strength and more confident
spirit than ever before. They were
holding a position which had not
yet been seriously attacked, and he
would venture the assertion that so
long as their flanks hold they will
not fall back.

As to probable casualties, the
people of Canada must be prepared
for a heavy list when the inevitable
attacks come. In the second bat-
tle of Ypres, six thousand men, or
forty per cent of the Canadian
forces fell. During 1917 Canadian
troops totalled 84,347, including 13,
461 at Vimy Ridge, 10,124 during the
fight that occurred in May; 10,
600 during the fighting in August;
2,706; presumed dead, 3,393; other
casualties, 790.

GERMANS EXPECTED TO DIVIDE ALLIES' FORCE IN 2 WEEKS

Failed In Spite of All Their
Advantages.

London, April 20.-Before the present
German offensive began, German officers
in neutral countries were prepared
to bet that the Germans would succeed
in dividing the forces of the Allies with-
in a fortnight. Lord Robert Cecil, min-
ister of blockade, declared in a speech
last night at Hitchen, he had been in-
formed a month has passed and the Ger-
mans have not succeeded. Lord Robert
concluded, "but would we be wickedly
foolish if we believed the battle is
ended. We have an indefinite period of
terrible and unbroken struggle before
us. We must not under our enemy,
who has had the great advantage of 50
years of preparation for war, give up
geographical position and united com-
mand."

Have Withstood Strain.
"But British citizens who have with-
stood the Germans for four years, who
know the Germans desire to live in peace
is equal to German training, while re-
cently our forces in France were placed
with the British army under the com-
mand of that great soldier, Gen. Foch."

Lord Robert did not think that the
Germans' formidable advantages would
decide the battle in his favor, but the
Allies must not come under the sway
of a too easy optimism.

German Unchanged.
The minister of blockade referred to
the revisions of the Prime Minister's
former German ambassador to London,
and other proofs showing that Germany
was absolutely unchanged since the
armistice. He said that the Germans
strove to hit the world to sleep by talk
of peace while planning this attack.
Since the battle has begun there has
been no talk of peace and nothing has
been heard but talk of German annexa-
tions, indemnities, and the power of the
German military caste and the slavery
of the rest of the world.

"We are fighting indubitably for the
freedom of the world. Anyone who
says the Germans desire to live in peace
with their neighbors and are ready to
make a just and righteous peace is in-
cluding in voluntary self-deception."

Northwest Mounted

QUEBEC, April 19.-It is reported
here that a detachment of the former
Northwest Mounted Police has arrived
in Quebec city to replace the federal
detectives entrusted with the work of
enforcing the M. S. A. It is said the
men are quartered at the Citadel, but
nothing definite is available.

Wilson on Parade
in a British Tank

WASHINGTON, April 19.-President
Wilson rode around the White House
grounds today in the British army fight-
ing tank Britannia which was brought
here for use in the Liberty Loan cam-
paign. The president first crawled
through a small tunnel in the side of the
tank and thoroughly inspected its work-
ing parts. Then the tank was closed
and the president was taken for a short
ride through the White House grounds.

Britishers in Italy
Make Successful Raid

ROME, April 19.-British troops oper-
ating on the Italian front made suc-
cessful raid yesterday in the Asiago
basin, where they inflicted heavy losses
on the Austrians and took 22 prisoners,
says today's war office report.

France Has Lost 1,300,000 Men in Fight For Liberty

NEW YORK April 19.-France, in
four years of conflict to preserve her
own liberty and that of the world, ac-
cording to M. Andre Tardieu, French
high commissioner to the United States,
has lost 1,300,000 men killed and al-
most as many wounded or prisoners.
The high toll exacted by the war was
made public by the noted French en-
voy today in an address at a meeting of
the "Fathers' Children of France" As-
sociation.

AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE OF COMMONS LISTENS TO CRITICISM OF L.D.A.

Sunday Labor Might Be Necessary to
Save Grain Crops.

OTTAWA, April 19.-The Commons
committee on agriculture at its ses-
sion this morning, under the presi-
dency of R. T. Henderson, member for
Macdonald, Man., had a long discussion
in reference to the labor problem. It
was decided to appoint a special com-
mittee to make a report to the next
meeting.

The committee consists of the follow-
ing members: Messrs. Morphy, Davis,
McIntosh, Col. Laing and Col.
MacKie.

There were strong expressions of
opinion by the members of the general com-
mittee in favor of employing interned
aliens and the closing up of non-essen-
tial industries.

There was some discussion of the
objection by the Lord's Day Alliance to
Sunday labor. While the work of the
Lord's Day Alliance and its objects were
highly praised, several members ex-
pressed the opinion that there were
conditions, most particularly at the
present time, when Sunday labor might
be absolutely essential in order to save
crops of grain, so greatly required in
the existing circumstances they thought
that the Lord's Day Alliance should
not insist on so strict an enforcement
of the Lord's Day act.

Sinn Fein Elected
to British Commons

LONDON, April 19.-Dr. Thomas Mc-
Carten has been elected without opposi-
tion to the House of Commons for the
Tullaghan division of King's County,
Ireland. He is a Sinn Fein.

Dr. McCarten was arrested at Halifax
last fall and taken to New York to be
arrested on the charge of having ob-
tained an American passport fraudu-
lently. He came to the United States
as a representative of the Sinn Fein
leaders.
