PERMANENT FORCE MEN, TAKEN ON SINCE WAR GO OVERSEAS, IF FIT

Members of the Permanent Force of Canada who are fit for service overseas in a combatant unit, and who have been enlisted temporarily for the duration of the war, are to be replaced as far as possible by men who are not fit for duty with "first line" troops.

This is the gist of an order received at district headquarters from Ottawa today, which states that where it is found necessary to enlist such men supernumerary to the establishment, such temporary personnel must be composed, except by special authority, of men in medical category "B" (fit for non-combatant service), or category "C" (fit for service in Canada).

The order also states that "as to any present temporary members of the Permanent Force enlisted under such terms, who belong to category 'A', they should be retained, and should be substituted for such men, other men belonging to category 'B' or category 'C'."

In order that as many as possible of category "A" men may be rendered available for overseas duty.

It is further pointed out that, in cases where the services of any temporary man may be dispensed with, selections should be made from among those who belong to category "A."

ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF STEALING BUGGY

VIOLINIST TO VISIT LONDON.—Isidore Menges, instrumentalist, is to appear for four recitals in London under the auspices of the Great War Veterans' Association of Canada. These recitals will be in the Masonic Temple from September 26 to 29.

COMES HOME ON LEAVE.—Lance-Corps Lewis Purdon, son of T. H. Purdon, K.C., is spending a week's leave with his parents at Port Stanley, prior to departure for overseas service with the Imperial Army. He has been in training at Toronto and Camp Borden for some time.

UNFIT FOR OVERSEAS.—Only two men applied for suits of khaki at the armories Monday and both were turned down as far as overseas service is concerned. One man, G. S. Hall, was considered by the medical officers fit to serve in Canada, and was allotted to No. 1 Special Service Company.

FEW FARMERS IN CITY.—Fewer farmers came to London Monday than at any previous time, but because of the particularly busy week they have had harvesting the large oat crop of the district, prices of hay and straw increased because few farmers were on the market grounds, and the consequent poor offerings of produce.

COMMITTEES ORGANIZED.—Organizing meetings of the finance and summer outing committees of the Soldiers' Aid Commission were held last night. J. P. Moore was unanimously re-elected chairman of the finance committee, in recognition of his work in the past year. Only routine business was done, estimates for the year being drawn up and advances to a number of soldiers discussed. R. J. Webster will remain chairman of the summer outing committee.

SEND A FINE EXHIBIT.—A fine collection of named varieties of gladioli were received by Mr. Frank Wood today from the Gifford gardens at Simcoe, Ont., and have been placed on exhibition in the main public library. The collection was forwarded by Campbell Bros., the commercial growers for Mr. Gifford, who intended to have it here for the exhibit last week, but were unable to do so, owing to their blooms being late, than usual. As the varieties are nearly all named they have a great interest to local growers of this flower, who may compare their own varieties.

ITALIANS CONTINUE TO MAKE PROGRESS AGAINST AUSTRIANS.—Rome, Aug. 28.—The Italians made further progress yesterday on the Polesina plateau, on the front north of Gorizia, the war office announced.

The Austrians made violent counterattacks, but failed to recover positions taken by the Italians.

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London Meat Dealers Say Big Packers Raised Price to an Impossible Figure in Order to Reap Profit in the Old Land—Vigorous Protest Entered by Meat Dealers Over Export of Canadian Cattle to United States.

That the order of the British food controller, Lord Rhodes, in prohibiting the export of hogs and bacon from the Dominion, is a counter move on the part of the British Government to "sting" the meat profiteers of this country, and that there would be no necessity for needless days and nights of meat prices were the Government to comply with the request of the food situation, was the gist of statements to The Advertiser by some of the foremost meat men of the city today.

Discussing the reported order of the British food controller, one man who has been in the cattle and hog business since 1890 said: "It serves the packers of this country right. The Canadian packers have had contracts with the British Government to supply the old country with hogs and cattle at practically the same prices that were prevalent in Canada."

Say Packers Sent Up Price.—Two weeks ago a big combined movement on the part of the packers sent hog prices of the country up to the \$20 mark. "It serves the packers of this country right. Other hog buyers said that Great Britain was certainly not going to buy Canadian hogs when the price of bacon in England was less than it was in Canada. They stated that the Argentine Republic supplies Britain with all her available cattle, and that while it costs about 30 cents to rear cattle in Argentina, the expense of raising cattle in this country is about \$50.

Denial.—The demand that the Government place an embargo on all foodstuffs going across the border is becoming more insistent and increasingly ominous. It is expected that the United States in order that huge profits may be realized, will place an embargo on the export of meat from the United States to Canada.

Eighty per cent of the pork and cattle of the States are Germans. The declared one man, "and they get the benefit of our cattle production by the way."

CITY MAY GET FISH FROM PORT AT 6 CENTS

While at Port Stanley last evening with the delegates to the Municipal convention, Ald. Manness, chairman of the high cost of living committee, and Controller R. W. Shaw improved the time by going into the fish business, and securing information. They are assured that London can get a supply.

"We had a talk with the fishermen," said Ald. Manness. "We were offered jumbo herring at 6 cents a pound, and a pound of cod at 7 cents. We were told that we should be able to get them delivered in London for a cent or two a pound more. We are going to take this matter up, and I feel we can get the citizens a cheap fish supply. Later we may be able to get the herrings at a lower figure."

COMFORTABLE HOME IS BETTER MONUMENT FOR RETURNED MEN THAN A COLD SHAFT OF STONE

Preparations for the campaign to be undertaken by the members of the Great War Veterans' Association to raise funds for the construction of a permanent home for the returned soldiers of this city have been going on for the past few days, and the association is now ready for the actual launching of the campaign today. Citizens in general seem to agree with the opinion that a comfortable home for the returned men would be of much greater benefit than a marble monument.

Lists Are Prepared.—Contributions have been procured and will be made use of throughout the campaign. Efforts will be made to meet the various chapters of the I. O. O. F., and to enlist their co-operation, as well as the assistance of all fraternal organizations in the city. Members of the association will also hold noon-hour meetings at the factories and business places, and will deliver on the objects of the association, and the purpose for which it is desirable to build a permanent home.

Veterans Full of Pep.—The members of the G. W. V. A. are enthusiastic over the prospects for the success of the movement, and are entering into the work in a businesslike way that vouches well for the achievement of their goal of a new home in this city.

more money to invest. It will give his family something if he is married, with which to meet the higher cost of living in these days.

"The fighting men are getting four and five times as much as the fighting man. The patriotic fund has alone saved many of our soldiers' families from poverty, believe in the preservation of wealth. Let us cut out the taxes on the people, who are ready to pay. The men who are making this country are suffering."

ARE MISERABLY PAID.—"The men are miserably paid," declared Mayor Bowley, Brantford. "I have known men who are suffering and in want, because the Government has not given the pension money quickly enough," declared Fred Wright, Montreal. "Let the Government keep the men until the pensions are paid."

"Conditions are being changed, and the men are kept on pay until the pensions are paid," said W. D. Lighthall. "That certainly has not reached Brantford," declared Mayor Bowley. "More equitable conditions would make enlistments much better," declared Ald. Ashplant. "Present conditions simply offend the man who stays at home. The inequalities of the system are evident."

Has to Send Him Money.—"Why should men in England be given furlough when they have no money to take them," said Mayor Hardie. "When my boy wants to have a holiday I have to send him money to the Government to back his pay. That should not be."

"Let us suggest something definite," said Ald. Risk, Toronto. "I would suggest double the pay for privates, and officers' wages to be adjusted by the Government." This carried unanimously.

Senator Plante was introduced a resolution asking that Government

been stung. Use some judgment," said Risk, Toronto.

Ald. H. B. Ashplant, London, discussed the question of the Bell Telephone franchise at some length. INDIAN SOLDIER GIVES HIS LIFE

Pte. John M. Schuyler Killed in Action August 15.

Word was received in the city today by Mrs. E. Schuyler, 566 William street, that her son, Pte. John Mitchell Schuyler, had been killed in action on August 15. He enlisted with the 15th Battalion at Alton, Ont., on December 15, 1914. He was wounded on June 2 at the battle of Vimy Ridge, and had been in the hospital since his recovery less than three weeks when he was killed. Prior to enlisting he was employed as a police feeder at the Southern Lithograph plant at Simcoe.

He is one of four Indian brothers who joined the khaki. Edward, who enlisted with the 14th (Haldimand) Battalion, and Roy, of the 7th Battalion, France yet, while Eugene is in England. Two brothers-in-law, Ben Reynolds of the 7th and Alex. Nicholas of the 15th, are also overseas.

PTE. LINFOT WOUNDED IN HEAD, ARM AND LEG

Word was received this morning by Mrs. L. Linfoot of 388 Horton street, that her son, Pte. Frederick Lorne Linfoot of the Army Medical Corps has been admitted to No. 2 Stationary Hospital from gunshot wounds in head, arm and fractured leg.

Pte. Linfoot enlisted here with the Army Medical Corps and went overseas with a draft January 1, 1916, having been in France for over a year.

Before enlisting he was employed at the Grand Trunk freight office. He has another brother, Charles, now in England with the A. M. C.

Pte. L. Linfoot has sent home a German gas mask which he picked up on the battlefield and also an arm badge for a German prisoner, who requested him to cut it off his arm. He is a prisoner. The badge bears No. 26, and is of the 1st division. The Germans of the United States may acquire fortunes very easily.

FOOD CONTROLLER MISLED, OR PACKERS ARE UNFAIR, SAYS BORDEN JOURNAL.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Montreal, Aug. 28.—The Gazette, leading Government organ, editorially today declares that either the food controller has misled the people of Canada or the British Government has shut down on Canadian bacon because Canadian packers have dealt unfairly with it.

AVIATOR SOARS OVER CITY AS LONDONERS GO TO WORK, IS OBSERVED BY THOUSANDS

Flier From One of Eastern Training Camps Moved Toward Southwest, Then Veered to the North—Long Distance Flight by Cadet.

About ten minutes past eight this morning an aeroplane was seen to pass over the city, flying in a westerly direction. As many citizens were out for a test flight of long duration, at the time, it was seen by hundreds of people, and much interest and speculation was aroused as to who the aerial visitor was, and where he was going.

The machine was apparently a biplane of the type in use for instructional purposes by the officers of the Royal Flying Corps, and seemed to be flying at a height of about 2,000 feet.

"I came from the east," said one man who had seen it, "and passed over the city a little south of the Normal School. It was moving at a rapid rate, and as it passed the city appeared to change the direction of its flight and to veer around slightly to the north."

It is thought that the flier was one of the cadets from the schools of the Royal Flying Corps at Camp Borden or Toronto, and that he was either out for a test flight of long duration, or that he had lost his way temporarily.

The flights at the school are made in the early morning and late in the evening, and it is easily within the range of possibility to start from either Camp Borden or Toronto, and fly directly to the city, and arrive in London at 8 o'clock.

The distance between London and Toronto, as the crow flies, is about 110 miles, and between here and Borden by the same method of reckoning, is about 150 miles. With a machine travelling between forty and fifty miles an hour, it would be a matter of time to leave either place at half-past five and arrive in London at 8 o'clock.

GLENCOE WOMAN IS RELEASED ON PAROLE

A Glencoe woman sentenced by Magistrate Graydon in May last to serve eight months on conviction on two theft charges was released from the county jail at noon today on a parole order from the department of justice.

Her liberation on parole makes the third woman to be released under the same conditions during the last three months. These three instances are the first in which women have been given their freedom from the local jail on parole. In all other cases in years past they have been removed to other institutions, where they were kept until the summer, when they have been released on parole for a longer period in the history of the institution.

Whether the parole system at the jail will continue in the future, but the fact remains that the parole order has been issued often during the last month that it has in years.

DESTRUCTIVE BUSH FIRES IN KOOTENAY COUNTRY; SALMO TOWN THREATENED

Neelson, B. C., Aug. 28.—One of the most destructive fires which have been known in the Kootenay country since the year started in a cedar flat near Salmo on Sunday. The fire was away by the blaze, and between two and three thousand cords of timber were destroyed. The season's cut of the Kootenay, representing the season's supply of lumber, is being sent to the mill. A crew of 150 men are working to contain the blaze which threatens the town.

A fire which broke out on the mountain side between Sprague and Grouse Creeks, Sunday, has approached some of the most valuable timber in the district. It is feared that the fire will spread to the city and is not anticipated.

A fire which started in the vicinity of O'Neill's Mill, Woodbury Creek, burned out the mill flumes and threatens the mining camp buildings.

Harold Cornish of Deep Creek and A. C. Zervitz of Salmo, were killed while engaged in fighting the forest fires.

NOT A VANDERBILT.

New York, Aug. 28.—A published cable dispatch received yesterday from London, stating that the Daily Mirror announced the marriage of Miss Gertrude Langtry and Lance-Corps George St. John, a Canadian army, and daughter of Frederick W. Vanderbilt of New York, denied the story. It was made today by Mr. Vanderbilt that Miss Langtry was his adopted daughter. He said he had no adopted daughter, and had never heard of Miss Langtry.
