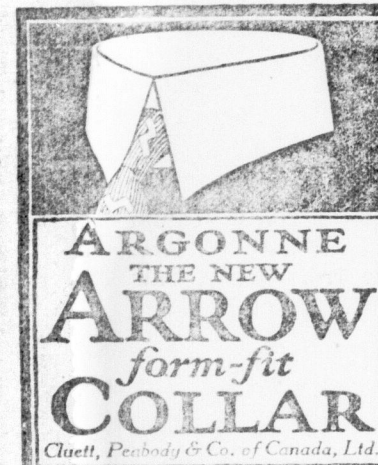

## Western U. Add New Plays to Repertoire for Big Clash

**Had Hard Workout in Mud Last Night Over at Park—Songsters Also Worked on Harmony Grid.**

"I'll say they are good mud horses," said one enthusiastic Western University student, who watched the practice last night at Tecumseh Park. Notwithstanding the slippery condition of the field, the full varsity squad was out, and went at it in good hard style for over an hour. The new boys introduced on Tuesday night were supplemented by several more, so that now the team has a good working knowledge of various plays, some of which will be used on a dry field and some in the mud. The whole system of tackling has been improved on since the last game, and several new take plays were tried out very successfully. The team's certainty in handling the ball in Toronto has decided Coach Brock to adopt the "tossed ball system" from the quarter-back to the backer. This will be found very superior to the old style of handing the ball to the backer, as this latter system necessitated the quarter running two or three steps to place the ball in the proper hands. The new way not only speeds the game up, but it gives the man carrying the ball an opportunity of getting properly into his stride before he hits the line. The team will workout for a couple of hours tomorrow, and will have a short signal practice on Friday afternoon. The men fully realize that their job is a big one, and they are quite determined to shake off the spirit of nervousness or lack of self-confidence in themselves that has been so apparent in the opening minutes of previous games, and which was so costly last Saturday.
