While the street car strike has been settled, correspondence relating to it is still in progress between Attorney-General W. R. Roney and the London Labor Representation Committee. The committee recently sent a letter protesting against the prospective withdrawal of the railway board from the city.

Mr. Roney in reply to this, states that "in the future, as in the past, the railway board will be at the service of the city of London to bring about a fair and equitable adjustment of the street railway difficulties."

Mr. Ellis in his memorandum declares that "in the first place, the committee made a thorough investigation into the accounts of the company. They found that there was no warrant for the proposed increase of the fare."

test made by the railway board in operating the road, in which your board appears to place its entire confidence as to the inability of the company to carry on, we maintain that no conclusion could be arrived at on so short a trial, particularly just at the time of the year at which this short test was made, without a doubt the smallest month of the year for street cars.

The weather was pleasant and cool, conducive for walking, amusement parks and recreation grounds were not in operation, and everything was against a fair test of earning power of the road just as this time. We submit that if the test had been continued for three or six months, the finding would have been quite the reverse. Again, we respectfully contend that this street car company have deliberately taken money from working capital during the past few years, in order to redeem as fixed assets for the company, thus crippling the road in the dying years of its franchise, in a deliberate attempt to force the city to get busy and follow up this offer, and endeavor to have a bylaw submitted that will take over the road, and that if necessary the company should be forced to resell some at least of those redeemed bonds, to replenish their working capital, which was purposely depleted in such an unbusinesslike manner.

However, we have the cars in service again, and our committee agree that the offer to sell the road at present value and relinquish the franchise, is a just one. If there is no "hook" in the offer, and we will agree, and endeavor to have a bylaw submitted that will take over the road, and that if necessary the company should be forced to resell some at least of those redeemed bonds, to replenish their working capital, which was purposely depleted in such an unbusinesslike manner.

Service Resumed.
Limited street car service was resumed at 11 o'clock Wednesday by the Ontario Railway Board. After getting the system in working order, A. B. Ingram, the vice-chairman, and J. H. Ellis left the car for Toronto at 1:30. Manager C. B. King and other officers of the company will remain in charge

as officials for the board. A member of the board will be in the city at frequent intervals to see that all directions are being carried out properly," said Mr. Ingram.

Only 34 cars are in operation as compared to 38 before the strike. Only three cars have been placed on the Ottawa line. These are running west on Dundas street. Two cars have been taken off the North Belt line, leaving only the one-way service, east on Dundas street. One car has been taken off the Normal, Richmond and Oxford lines. Three cars have been added to the Dundas line from Ridout street to Eleanor street.

Work for All Employees.
John Colbert, president of the employees' union, told the city council Tuesday night that an arrangement of this kind would mean that 25 men would

be out of employment permanently. Mr. Ingram said Wednesday that this had been avoided and that work would be found for all the men. Ald. Ashton of the union executive confirmed this statement to some extent. He said that as far as he knew, all the men would be employed, but that this would not be positively assured for some days.

According to statements made at the city council last night, the city will make no objection to the reduced service, although it is certain to fall below the standard demanded up to the time of the strike by the city engineer. The railway board has power to re-route and change the system as it pleases, and as the city council is anxious to keep out of the matter entirely, it is likely that the present arrangement will continue indefinitely.

These increased fares, with a settlement of this nature in

effect, the prospect of an immediate vote on increased fares or the purchase of the road is slight. The only legal vote on a purchase of the road during the year is one which would place the road in the hands of the hydro-electric commission. If the vote is taken in January, then either the city or the hydro-electric commission can purchase the road according to what the people decide. As the cars are in operation again, a majority of the council will likely approve the latter plan, as this will give the citizens the right to determine for themselves how the road shall be run.
