BROTHERHOOD WORKERS ASKED TO ASSIST IN RELIGIOUS CENSUS OF CITY

It is expected that the Brotherhood workers will take an active part in the social survey work of the city and religious census. The proposition was put to the Brotherhood at the rally, Maitland Street Baptist Church on Thursday evening by Rev. T. D. McCullough, secretary of the Social Service Council. The matter was left to the executive for decision, but judging from the expressions of opinion the members favor the idea.

Mr. McCullough suggested placing five workers in each subdivision of the city some Sunday afternoon to take a census of the residents relative to their sex, age, nationality, denomination. He said the religious section of the survey could be disposed of in two Sunday afternoons' work, or probably one.

WILL TAKE PART IN CROP COMPETITIONS

Farmers of Oxford County To Enter Corn and Oats.

WOODSTOCK, Jan. 21.—The farmers of Oxford County will take part in the field crop competitions conducted by the Provincial Government. This action was decided on at the annual meeting of the Woodstock Agricultural Society this afternoon. In past years individual farmers took part in the standing oat competition, but today the society, backed up by a big representation of farmer delegates, decided that the corn and oats would be competed for this year by the county as a whole.

The meeting of the society was the best ever held, the city and the different townships being well represented. The financial reports of Secretary W. H. West showed the association to have had a very prosperous year. The annual three-day exhibition held in September was a success both in attendance and in the number of exhibits in all sections of the show. A balance of \$788 on the right side of the ledger put the officers and directors in a happy mood, and plans for a bigger and better exhibition for 1921 are already under way.

NEW \$80,000 SCHOOL OPENED AT GUELPH

Addresses Made by Chairman of the Board and Others.

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At The Theaters

AT ALLEN'S.
Rising from a writing to political base of his city by night, a wing arm, irrespective of whether that night is used for the best interests of the community or not, is not a very high standard of ethics, yet it forms the basis for a play under the title of "Hold Your Horses," which was presented at the Allen yesterday, and which will be repeated again today.

The principal role gives Tom Moore as Canavan, a real fighting Irishman, full play for his particular line of histrionic ability. He is given excellent support throughout by Naomi Childers, as the haughty society belle; Beatrice Jones, later Mrs. Canavan, and finally Mrs. Canavan's friend, the strong, cast. The arousing of the manhood in Canavan through a brief trust with the petty authority attached to holding a red flag to stop traffic on Fifth Avenue during some blustering operations is suggestive of a casual study of the play.

How this leads to his employment by a politician as a ward heeler, his rise to "boss" and eventual entry into the ranks of society, is too long a story to relate, but its development on the film makes a very pleasant evening's entertainment.

Along with this feature film is coupled a most amusing two-reel comedy, "For the Night," the cast for which includes the famous Christie Follies chorus; an Allen World News film; "Mutt and Jeff" cartoon and an interesting series of seven snapshots. The musical feature of the bill, which will be presented again today, was the overture "Lady Bill."

TILLSONBURG CHURCH HAS A GOOD BALANCE
More Than \$5,000 Raised by Presbyterians During the Year.

TILLSONBURG, Jan. 21.—The annual meeting of the Avondale Presbyterian Church was held in the schoolroom, John McFarlane in the chair. The congregation numbered 164, and the different reports read and adopted showed the church to be in the most flourishing condition. During the year a new motor and entire new lighting system has been installed, also a furnace and many other improvements, costing hundreds of dollars. The church has a cash balance of \$715.20, with no outstanding debts, and the church holding property valued at \$10,000. The year's financial statement was presented by the pastor, Rev. T. McLachlan, D.D., in place of the customary three weeks.

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DR. O. I. CUNNINGHAM ELECTED HEAD OF BOARD OF HEALTH

Plumbing and Restaurant By-laws Laid Over for Later Consideration.

Dr. O. I. Cunningham was elected chairman of the board of health at its inaugural meeting Friday afternoon. He was nominated by J. H. Saunders, who was chairman last year. Dr. Cunningham was a member of the city council for several years.

The adoption of a recommendation by Dr. C. S. Tamin, deputy inspector, that all dairies must be inspected and have a certificate from the medical officer of health, was the outstanding business of the meeting. A second clause relating to pasteurization was laid over for consideration at a later date. Dr. Tamin stated that there were some new theories along this line which he wished to investigate.

Inspection of factory workers reported to have disease was discussed. Dr. Downham stated that he made a thorough investigation of any such instances reported. He did not think contagion was likely to result from touching articles handled by such workers.

Against Placarding. No definite action was taken in regard to the restaurant by-law. Chairman Cunningham said he was not in favor of placarding the restaurants, as in many cases an injustice might be done. He suggested that weekly reports be published instead.

The plumbing by-law was laid over for consideration at a later date. The chairman expressed the belief that it was a mistake to have this work undertaken by the board of health. He advised that the plumbing law be as simple as possible, and that the requirements be not in favor of this, he advised giving away with the by-law altogether.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE THE H. AND B. ELECTIFICATION
Chamber of Commerce Does Not Indorse Scheme at Present.

To investigate into the advisability of electrifying the L. H. and B. and Stratford lines, the directors of the local Chamber of Commerce will appoint a special committee, it was announced at a meeting of the directors of that society at noon today. The committee will work in conjunction with representatives of other municipalities interested and will bring a report back to the local council. This action does not mean that the Chamber of Commerce indorses the scheme. It was announced, but it was thought the scheme warranted investigation.

Blame Fee System. As the result of complaints made by residents outside of Middlesex, that they had been persecuted by the county police when they motored to London, which was taken up at a previous meeting of the directors, the directors, taken up with the Ontario Motor League. Officials of the league assured the directors that the matter had already been brought to the attention of the public service commission of the Provincial Government. The complaint, they said, was general throughout the province.

The blame for the alleged unjust arrests and fines, was put on the fee system in vogue in the county. It was

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
