A MILITARY DICTATOR REQUIRED IN TURKEY

London Opinion That Serious Disturbances Are Likely—Interviews With New Sultan.

LONDON, April 29.—Abdul Hamid's disastrous reign, which opened with Bulgarian atrocities, close in a most dramatic fashion with massacres of Armenians in Anatolia. His disappearance as sultan appears to cause but few regrets here and abroad, but the course of Turkish affairs will be watched with great interest...

The Constantinople correspondent of 'The Daily Chronicle' was received in London by Mehmed Reschad Effendi at the moment the national assembly was sealing the fate of Abdul Hamid.

The correspondent describes him as not unimpressive, although his face has a bloated appearance, owing to good living and excess of food. The sultan bears a remarkable resemblance to his dethroned brother. His lips are thick and slightly protruding; he has the same curled-up fashion of hair which is untinged with gray...

After a silent salute Essau'd Pasha pronounced in slow tones the decree of deposition, at which the sultan shuddered. The sultan then, followed by an equally painful colloquy, lasting a quarter of an hour, Abdul Hamid pleaded for his life, and begged for the lives of his family. He protested his devotion to the people and his innocence in recent events.
