MEDICAL REGISTRATION

Committee to Discuss Reciprocity
With Provinces.

The Council of the College of Physi-
cians and Surgeons of Ontario met
yesterday afternoon in the college
building on University-avenue, and
will continue in session for the re-
mainder of the week. Vice-President
Dr. E. A. P. Hardy was given to ap-
point a committee of two members to
discuss the question of reciprocity with
Manitoba and the Northwest Provinces
as soon as those councils shall have
appointed committees. Letters were
received from Manitoba, British Col-
umbia and Michigan regarding reci-
procity. The British Columbia com-
munication stated that that province
was not prepared to deal with the ques-
tion yet. Manitoba has appointed a
committee to meet the Ontario rep-
resentatives during the meeting of the
Canadian Medical Association in Aug-
ust.

E. T. Campbell, postoffice inspector
at London, wrote that "he had been
investigating the operations of Drs.
Kennedy & Kennedy of Detroit, but
did not see what he could do or what
action the postoffice could take, as the
doctors in question do not live in Can-
ada. He suggested, however, that the
solicitor of the council see whether the
Medical Act would apply in view of
the fact that a postoffice box was used
in Windsor for Ontario business. The
letter was sent to the committee on
rules and regulations.

The officers elected for the ensuing
year were: President, Dr. E. A. P.
Hardy; vice-president, Dr. J. L. Lane;
registrars, Dr. W. L. Bray, treasurer,
Dr. Wilberforce Atkins, prosecutor,
Chas. Rose; solicitor, H. S. Osler;
auditor, Dr. Patton.

Dr. W. Britton wrote tendering his
resignation from the council, on ac-
count of his assumption of professional
duties in connection with life insur-
ance.

The council will meet again this
morning at 10 o'clock.
