WHEAT ADVANCES ON EXPECTATIONS Forecasts of Return of European Buying Induce

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Bulge in Prices. EXPECT MORE VESSELS

Chicago Trade Believes Ships Will Be Diverted From Argentine.

Chicago, Dec. 10.—Forecasts of a return of foreign buying helped to bring about a bulge in wheat prices during the last half-hour Saturday, notwithstanding that thru out the rest of the session the market had been weak. It was explained that at least a certain percentage of the increased tonnage would be ships diverted from Argentina. Until weekend, evening-up of trades began, however, the bulls seemed unable to do a great deal in the direction of overcoming declines, let alone establishing an advance.
