GEORGIA PEACHES OFFERED YESTERDAY

Light Demand for Other Foreign Fruits on Wholesale Market.

CANADIAN FRUITS
Shipments Were Light and Demands Were Plentiful.

The Canadian shipments were again light, with an active demand, at firm prices. Raspberries came in fairly well in the morning, but the day's supply was small, but there was only a very small quantity shipped in in the afternoon, which sold at 12 to 16 per box. Cherries remained about stationary, the sour variety selling at 75c to 81 per 11-quart, and the sweet variety at 81 to 85 per 11-quart, the few sweet cherries being slightly easier, the bulk selling at \$1 to \$1.40, an odd one bringing \$1.50. Red currants remained about stationary at 75c to 80c per box, and 80c to 85c per bushel. Gooseberries remain scarce at 65c to 71 per 11-quart, and 70c per bushel. Some of the best Georgia peaches offered came in yesterday, and sold rapidly at \$2.25 to \$3.50 per six-basket carrier. Canadian peaches are of very poor quality, the best selling at 20c to 25c, and the 11's at 60c. Canadian apples are also poor quality, the best selling at 15c to 20c per bushel, and 50c to 60c per 11-quart. New potatoes are quite firm, at \$3.65 to \$4.00 per bushel. McWilliam & Everist had a car of Georgia peaches of exceptionally fine quality, selling at \$2.25 to \$3.25 per six-basket carrier; a car of California fruits, including peaches, pears, apples, etc., at \$1.50 per case, and pears at \$2.25; a car of cantaloupes, flats at \$2.25, pines at \$2.00, and watermelons at \$1.50. A. A. McKinnon had two cars of new potatoes, selling at \$3.65 per bushel. Black 11's, 12's and 13's, selling at \$1.75 to \$2 per hamper; a car of oranges at \$4.50 to \$5 per bushel; a car of White & Co. baskets of watermelons, selling at 60c to 65c each; a car of North Carolina peaches, selling at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per bushel. Strenach & Sons had a car of California peaches—peaches at \$1.25 to \$1.50, plums at \$2 to \$2.25, and pears at \$2.25 to \$2.50 per bushel. Also two cars of potatoes at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per bushel, and \$1.50 to \$1.75 per bushel. Chas. S. Simpson had a car of hamper peaches, selling at \$2.25. Apples—Imported, new, 50c to \$1.75 per bushel. Blueberries—\$1.25 to \$1.50 per bushel. Currants—Red, 70c and 80c per box, 40c per six-basket, 65c to 80c per 11-quart; black 11's, 12's and 13's, selling at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per bushel. Cherries—Canadian, sour, 65c to 71 per 11-quart; sweet, \$2.25 per 11-quart. Gooseberries—Red, 65c per bushel, 81 per 11-quart. Grapes—California Malaga, \$4 per case. Lemons—Yardville, \$8 to 10 per case. Oranges—Late Valencia, \$4.25 to \$5.50 per case. Limes—\$2 per 100. Peaches—California, \$1.25 to \$1.50 per bushel; Georgia, \$2.25 per bushel, \$2.25 to \$2.50 per six-basket carrier. Pears—Barlett, \$2.25 to \$2.50 per bushel. Plums—\$2 to \$2.50 per bushel. Raspberries—\$1.50 per bushel. Strawberries—\$1.50 per bushel. Watermelons—\$1.50 to \$1.75 per bushel. Cantaloupes—\$1.50 to \$1.75 per bushel. Cauliflower—Canadian, 60c to 75c per 11-quart, \$2 to \$3 per bushel. Celery—Kalamazoo, 40c to 50c per dozen bunches. The buying power of the public continues good. The wholesale trade is better than at this time of year ago. In some lines of drygoods the season has been disappointing. The earlier cold weather impaired the sale of wash goods. Business in the stock market remains steady. The good crop of hay already harvested and the great promise for later harvests are stimulating factors in the trade in some lines of drygoods. Deliveries to wholesalers have been improved. The movement of print goods from the factories has been heavy. The grocery trade is just fair for the time. Many people are out of the city. The fruit trade has been active, cherries, raspberries, blueberries, tomatoes on the upward incline. In raw materials, however, the one of the market remains easier. Large orders for paints are coming to Canadian firms. Summer lines of self hardware are going freely, but for more distant future needs, retailers are buying sparingly. Carpet dealers report scarcity in linoleums. But business has been good in carpets. Collections in most branches of trade are satisfactory, in some cases exceptional prompt.

CANADA CAR SHAKE-OUT.
Support at Low Figure in Montreal Market.
Heron & Co. had the following at the close of the market:
MONTREAL, July 28.—The selling of Canada Car was resumed today, forcing the price down to 45. The selling would indicate that small holders are better shaken out. Support was in evidence at the low figure touched today, and the liquidation seems to be over for the time being. At present prices the troubles of this company should be pretty well discounted, and the recent break seems to have disposed of many weak holders, leaving the stock in stronger hands. There were no features to the market outside of this stock, and there was little or no change in prices.

WHEAT FIRST ROSE THEN WENT DOWN

Highest Point of Season Reached in First Hour of Trading.

LARGE HOUSES SOLD
Heavy Offerings Jolted Confidence of Bulls, Forcing Reaction.

CHICAGO, July 28.—Despite the fact that wheat at one time today touched the highest price of the season, the market, extending during the first hour, was on the downward. Bears made much of assertions by a prominent expert that crop losses would perhaps not reduce the yield in the Dakotas and Minnesota much under a seven year average. The close was changed to 15c and lower with September \$1.22 1/2, and December \$1.25 1/2. Corn finished 1/2c off to 1 1/2c up, oats 1/2c up, and provisions unchanged. It was soon apparent, however, that advances in prices were beginning to act as a decided check on the enthusiasm of buyers. At this juncture a big house jolted the market, causing a still greater extent, especially as the chief bulk of the selling appeared to be somewhat authoritative. The market was then in the three principal states northwest might prove much better than has of late been generally assumed.

Considerable interest was taken by wheat traders in the circumstances, that last week's damage in the northwestern states was found on comparisons with last year's abnormally large crop. The total of the Dakotas and Minnesota in 1915 was 259,000,000 bushels, whereas a ten-year average for the three states is about 19,000,000 bushels. The corn values showed a good deal of fluctuation, but the market was largely off by word that within the last ten days 2,000,000 bushels of corn had been bought to come to the U. S., to be utilized mainly for glucose. New receipts were relatively easy through the season. Hoarding sales were numerous. High quotations on hogs gave firmness to provisions. Arrivals of hogs at the leading western markets were less numerous than last week of a year ago.
