EUROPE IS SPOT FOR BIG FIGHT

American Press Agents Fail With Their Loud Blasts of Money and Locations.

It appears more and more certain, with each passing day, that the world's heavyweight championship battle between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier will have to be staged in Europe, if anywhere.

Charles B. Cochran, the English theatrical promoter, who claims to hold an irrevocable contract with Carpentier, has further documentary evidence yesterday to back this contention.

He showed a cable from Yvetta Breyer, one of his European agents, in which Deschamps, the manager of Carpentier, sent assurance that he intended to abide by the contract entirely at Cochran's disposal, and that, moreover, he Deschamps had no serious offer from any other promoter to date.

From this it would appear that most of the alleged money-made talk of American promoters may have been simply airy fantasies.

In a signed statement yesterday, Cochran declared it was not at all likely that the fight would be staged in New Jersey.

"It is true," he stated, "that I have been approached by an American promoter to join him in bringing the bout off on Labor Day in that state. While I am not opposed to the idea, I do not believe that it will draw nearly as much money in New Jersey, where the bout must be fought, as it will in England, where the men can box twenty rounds than eight rounds in New Jersey."

ALL AFTER DEMPSEY.
