Major and Minor Leagues Work Under Improved Gentleman's Agreement.

Chicago, Feb. 13.—The major and minor baseball leagues decided at their oint meeting here today to continue to work under the "gentleman's agreement" which prevailed last year, with one -the appointment of an arbitraboard to handle all disputes. This board will consist of two members--the chairman of the National Commission and one representative from the minor eague. A third, a referee, a man not nected with any baseball organizaconnected with any baseball organization, will be chosen to cast the deciding vote in case of a deadlock.

John Heydler, president of the National League, suggested that the arbitration board be known as the baseball arbitration board of America.

Last year the major and minor leagues came to the parting of the ways, but it was agreed in New York at the league meeting of the National and American organizations, that the majors would respect the contracts of the players in the minor organizations. Under this agreement they operated in 1919.
