SIMULTANEOUS RAIDS IN SIX LARGE CITIES

Conspiracy Charges Against
Twenty-Eight Persons—Five
Are Millionaires.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—(Special).—Armed with bench warrants issued by the supreme court of the District of Columbia, special agents of the department of justice this morning at 11 o'clock, eastern time, simultaneously raided brokers' offices in New York, Philadelphia, Jersey City, Baltimore, Cincinnati and St. Louis.

Conspiracy indictments in which 29 persons are named—five of them said to be millionaires, and all interested in brokers' offices in large cities of the United States—were returned late yesterday by the federal grand jury of the District of Columbia upon evidence which agents of the department of justice had been gathering for more than a year.

The men indicted are said to be those financially interested in the corporations known as F. S. Boggs & Company, which has offices in New York and Philadelphia; Price & Company, which has offices in Baltimore and New York; and the Standard Stock and Grain Dealers, which has offices in Jersey City, Philadelphia, Cincinnati and St. Louis.

This, the United States government's first attack upon stock gambling, has been thoroughly prepared with the greatest secrecy. Its scope practically covers the United States from the Mississippi River to the Atlantic. The three concerns indicted maintain more than 25 offices and branch offices located from New England to Oklahoma.

EXCITEMENT IN NEW YORK

Preusser Handled Business for Suspected Brokerage Offices.

NEW YORK, April 2.—(Special).—The raids conducted in this city perturbed the financial district at its busiest hour, but the excitement was soon over. In the office of Boggs & Co. were a dozen or more men, mostly said to have been employees. Their names and addresses were taken and they were permitted to go. But Richard E. Preusser, Lee Mayer and Oliver J. Robinson, three of the indicted men, were arrested and taken to police headquarters, from where it was planned to send them to the federal building for arraignment before a United States commissioner.

Preusser is the man who shot and killed Myles McDonnell, the Harlem gambler, in the Hotel TenEyck, Albany, with a sawed-off shotgun several years ago. After serving a few months in the Matteawan State Asylum for the insane, he was released and since then has had trouble with the Wall-street police over his business matters. "Under the name of Boggs & Co.," said Detective McDonnell, "Preusser and a few of his companions have

handled all of the business for many suspected 'brokerage offices' throughout the country. These brokers would transmit the order of customers to Boggs & Co., and Preusser would execute the orders on the Consolidated Exchange of Philadelphia. At least the books show this, but the fact is that not one single share of stock was ever actually transferred, and that substituted the bucket shop ring with Boggs & Co. as the clearing house."

WHITE STAR—DOMINION LINE CANADIAN SERVICE

The two new and powerful steamers, the Laurentic (triple screw with turbine and reciprocating engines), and Megantic (twin screw), especially designed for the St. Lawrence route, will again be in the service in 1910, commencing with the sailing of the Laurentic on May 14 and every fortnight thereafter, in conjunction with the Dominion Line steamers Canada and Dominion. These are the largest and most modern steamers on the St. Lawrence, the former being 14,892 tons and the latter 14,878 tons, and their large displacement and the big keels with which they are fitted cannot fail to secure for them that foremost sailing quality—absolute steadiness.

The accommodation in first and second-classes is of the latest type, with every comfort, special attention being paid to the cuisine and service.

An electric passenger elevator, serving four decks, will prove acceptable to the company's patrons, and shows that the most exacting needs have been anticipated. The Marconi system of wireless telegraphy is installed on these steamers, and also submarine signaling apparatus, the value of each being universally recognized.

The ventilating system on the new steamers provides for the circulation of a constant supply of pure air throughout the various compartments by means of powerful electrically-driven fans, particular attention being given to the public rooms, dining saloons, etc., to insure their freshness. The ventilated air is extracted and the free admission of fresh air is induced.

The luxuries supplied in these steamers are on the most generous scale. Each first-class stateroom is fitted with a portable electric reading lamp, in addition to the fixed lamps; there is a complete system of electric bells throughout the first and second-class accommodation. Each first-class stateroom is furnished with a wardrobe, a chest of drawers and a handsome double folding lavatory.

The dining saloons, smooch-rooms, reading-rooms and lounge are all large, airy and handsomely furnished. The first-class dining saloon is a handsome apartment situated on the saloon deck and extends the full width of the ship. It is paneled in the stately fashion of the time of Charles II. It has a verandah for the bandstand and the tables are arranged on the restaurant principle.

The reading-room is a charming apartment on the upper promenade deck. The furniture is inlaid birch, the carpet crimson Axminster and the walls beautifully decorated. The lounge is also on the upper promenade deck and handsomely paneled in oak. A large and well selected library invites recreation and study and

writing tables afford an opportunity for correspondence.
The smoke-room (also on this deck) is very cosy and comfortable. The walls are hung with stamped leather and adorned with handsome leaded glass windows at the forward and aft end. The seats are deep and luxuriously upholstered.
The second-class staterooms are on the shelter deck and are tastefully furnished and decorated. Passengers traveling in this class will find every provision made for their comfort.
