## All-Toronto Team Record Defeat 74th Regiment

The All-Toronto relay team, established a new world's record at Buffalo Friday night, when they defeated the crack 74th Regiment team in 4:39.3.5, the previous mark being 4:41.15, held by the 74th.

The All-Toronto team was made up of C. F. Bolton, C. L. Watson, J. Treasider and Jack Tait. Bolton left the mark with Elworthy for the 20 distance, and was beaten about 10 yards. Snelly added four yards to this distance when he beat Charlie Watson. Treasider, running in third form, pulled the lead down to seven yards in the 90's. Jack Tait, running against Gies in the last 80, never ran better, and just won out at the wire. He ran the half in 1:13, which is a world's record for an indoor half mile. The winners received a great ovation.

NEW YORK, March 30.—President Barrow of the International League to-day fined the Montreal Club the sum of \$200 for permitting the draft of the International League schedule to get out of its hands before it was officially released.
