PURITY CAMPAIGN DOES NOT MEET THEIR VIEWS

Government Party in York County is Not Enthusiastic Over It—Only Eight Members of Government Committee Attended Conference.

Fredericton, Feb. 19.—The meeting of committees from the government and opposition parties to consider an anti-purity campaign on the resolution presented to each by the Social and Moral Reform Association convened this afternoon at the council chamber, city hall. Much interest was taken in the proceedings, as many were anxious to learn how the government party would meet with the question of purity in elections. After some little delay Alfred Rowley, of Miramichi, was called to the chair and R. B. Hanson was requested to act as secretary. The clerk of the city was well represented, among those present being Father Carney, Canon Cowie, Sub-dean Street, Rev. J. H. McDonald, Rev. J. C. Berrie, Rev. J. W. McConnell and others. The chairman in a few brief words explained the object of the meeting and asked the Rev. Mr. McDonald to present to those present the resolution passed upon by the association.

At this juncture A. D. Thomas, arose and said as twenty-five had been selected from each party to act, he suggested the roll be called and the fifty representatives take their seats inside of the hall. This suggestion met with unanimous approval. The secretary then called the names, starting with the opposition delegation. The following answered to the roll call: David Richards, ex-Warden Scott, Dr. Harry McNally, John Oldham, C. K. Howard, Dr. Vanwart, Dr. Geo. J. McNally, Capt. Guthrie, David Richards, A. D. Thomas, W. J. Dykeman, W. H. Vanwart, Councilor Rogers, James White, Alex. H. McNally, Tabor Everett, C. H. Thomas, Warden Byron McNally, Councilor Smith, Matthew Tennant, John Scott, Wm. Sanson, Dr. McLeod, Alderman Doherty, making a total of 24. J. M. Wiley, the 25th delegate, was unavoidably absent. On motion, J. S. McKnight was selected, making the delegation complete.

When the government committee was called only eight responded, namely: W. J. Osborne, W. A. Walsh, B. Staples, Alex. Brewer, Dr. McLeod, C. K. Parlee, H. Goodspeed, C. F. Chestnut. After some persuasion Henry Chestnut consented to act, saying that he was expressing no political opinion but he was strongly desirous of seeing the principle of purity in elections carried out.

For a short time it looked as if the meeting would end in a fizzle, the opposition pointing out that the government committee had failed to live up to its resolution and were represented by only one-third of that committee.

Mr. Osborne and Dr. McLeod, on behalf of the government party, regretted very much the way their delegates had acted but they assured all that any pledges entered into by them would be carried out by the party.

The opposition did not think this assurance satisfactory, contending that those present on behalf of the government never took an active part in elections and were not in a position to make promises for hands and consciences. Dr. McLeod and C. H. Thomas requested that the convention act as if both parties were fully represented. They did not want to see a failure, and they felt that though the government committee failed to keep their agreement, the opposition could afford to be generous and take the pledges of those present as representing each party. This was finally decided upon.

The Rev. J. H. McDonald then read the resolution drawn and which the association had prepared. It was in almost the same terms as the resolution adopted in Carleton and Charlotte counties. It prohibits run and money and an improper number of agents at the polling districts, provides for the depositing of \$500 by each party in some chartered bank guaranteeing the faithful performance and the appointing of a committee of five, two chosen from each party and the fifth by the Social and Moral Reform Association. It was also agreed that twenty men be chosen from each party, the opposition choosing the government and government choosing the opposition to sign the agreement made. Of the committee of five, the government selected Henry Chestnut and W. J. Osborne and the opposition Dr. McLeod and Councilor Rogers. The association will choose their representatives later.

The little interest taken by the government party in the movement as shown by its small attendance has given the opposition a great deal of satisfaction. The opposition has fully lived up to its undertakings.

At Miramichi this evening Mayor McLeod and Councilor Robinson addressed an audience that nearly filled the large hall. Many ladies were present and considering that Miramichi in times past has always been pretty nearly unanimous for the government, the opposition gave the government party a sore blow to the already defeated remnants.

Mayor McLeod had a fine reception, and at the close of his able address many old time government supporters went forward to shake hands with him. They confessed openly that they were Liberals, but they thought that a change of government could not do any harm.

The government party have been depending on Fredericton and Miramichi to reduce the big county vote, but it will surprise no one if these two places, instead, increase it.
