nts be made ing or next expiration of termination 3rd.—That all parishes and missions receiving aid from the D. C. S. toward the salary of their minister, shall by their wardens, or other representatives, pay to the Secretary of the Society half-yearly, on or before the 30th of June and 31st December in each year, such proportions of the required salary as may be arranged by mutual consent of themselves and the Diocesan Church Society.

4th.—On receipt of the stipulated half-yearly amount from the parish or mission, the Secretary shall accept the order of the minister for the full half year's salary as agreed upon jointly by the two contracting parties.

5th.—Should the minister accept part of the amount payable by the parish or mission in kind at cash prices, his receipt for the sum in the form of a Bill of items, may be counted by the wardens or representatives towards making up the amount to be paid by the parish or mission.

6th.—Should the sums agreed to be paid by the wardens or representatives not be paid when due, or within thirty days after falling due, the proportion agreed to be paid by the D.C.S. may be continued for six months, and the Executive Committee shall enquire into the cause of such deficiency, and consider the subject at the ensuing meeting.

7th.—The receipt of the Clergyman for money given at the offertory may be received from the Wardens as part of the conditional payment required by the Society from the people.

CHURCHES.

Every application for aid in the erection of a Church must contain the following information:—

1.—The precise situation, especially with reference to the nearest Church and to the amount of population within five miles of the Church.

2.—The title of the ground on which the building is to be erected.

3.—The size of the building, the numbers it can accommodate, and probable amount of the congregation that will usually attend it.

4.—The proposed cost of the building, the progress it has made towards completion, and the amount of contributions on the spot in money or labor.

5.—The frequency and regularity of the proposed so vices in the Church.

6.—That all the sittings are to be free and unappropriated.

It is the wish of the Executive Committee that no Clergyman show when building a Church, rely upon aid from this Society, without first ascertaining whether it is in the power of the Society to grant any assistance.
