

## "DEUTSCHLAND UEBER ALLES" IS AN OLD SCHEME



"Deutschland Ueber Alles," so far at least as Europe is concerned, is no new dream in Germany. This is shown by the curious old map reproduced above, which shows the whole continent from Portugal to the boundary of Asia as one German state with Berlin as its capital. It will be noted that German names have been given to all boundary waters.

The map was found in an old book of cuttings, the property of the late Archibald Constable, King's Printer of Edinburgh, Scotland, and a cousin of the founder of the British publishing house of Constable and Company. The map was forwarded to The Star by Alexander C. Constable, of Glasgow, British Columbia.

## OUTNUMBERED THREE TO ONE

Graphic Account of Three Day  
Fight in Mountains North of  
Saloniki — Bulgars Lost 4,000  
Men

Paris, Dec. 21—How a single division of General Sarraill's Balkan army fought three Bulgarian divisions to a standstill and gave indirect relief to the Serbians at Babuna Pass is described in a semi-official report of the campaign made public here today. The report, which is written by a French officer, summarizes the early operations in Serbia and then goes on to say:

"By the end of October we took up positions on the Cerna with the object of commanding the road leading from Priep. The Serbian southern army was then only a few miles from us, fighting desperately. On November 5 one of our battalions seized Gradsko station. The same night a company from the Belfort battalion sent a reconnaissance party to the formidable height upon the crest of which stands the Archangel monastery. This scouting party discovered that the enemy were occupying all the surrounding heights.

On November 9 our left wing, farther to the north, carried Airkovo village and gained a footing on the heights to the west and north-west. Then with fixed bayonets they swept on toward Krusevica.

"Disquieted by our rapid advance the Bulgarians violently counter-attacked, drenching our positions with a storm of shells, launching an attack with a battalion against our troops on the Green Knoll. This company resisted gallantly for several hours, but unfortunately the ammunition gave out and it was impossible to take up supplies. By evening the company was surrounded. One section, without cartridges, defended the position with the bayonet for a whole hour before the officer in command ordered a retirement. The officer formed the remainder of his men into a square and continued heroic resistance until 10.30 the following morning, when the attack of the Bulgarians grew weaker owing to their heavy losses. At 2 a. m. when only a few cartridges were left, the remaining members of the company formed into a column, four abreast and with fixed bayonets, charged through a thick fog. They forced a breach and re-joined their regiment.

"On November 10 the foot chasseurs carried the lower Cicevo. The battle continued furiously around Sirkovo and Krusevica. Hand-to-hand fighting was frequent. On November 11 the chasseurs captured the upper Cicevo but the commander-in-chief, learning that the Bulgarians had received strong reinforcements ordered a retirement on the lower Cicevo. However the object of our attack was attained, as we had attracted enemy troops from Babuna Pass, where they were pressing the Serbs.

"The Bulgarians now had three divisions against our one, and early on November 12 they began to attack, swarming down the mountain sides in compact masses. The battle lasted three days without our giving any ground. The Bulgars were moved down rightfully by our rapid-fire guns, our mountain guns and our seventy-fives. Swept by machine-gun fire and hacked by bayonets, the Bulgarians retreated beyond the heights on November 15 leaving the ground strewn with dead and dying. The fighting cost them nearly 4,000 men. Our losses were relatively light. Our troops behaved magnificently. They fought with bravery and coolness, never losing their faith even at the height of the battle."

PART OF OLD MAIN LINE  
OF THE I. C. R. ABANDONED

Moncton, Dec. 22—The old main line of the I. C. R. between Moncton and Catamount has been abandoned. About a year and a half ago it was decided that the trains going north from Moncton might as well be given the advantage of the easier grade of the Transcontinental. A three mile section of the main line of the I. C. R., which ran by the railway shops here, was abandoned, and at a point called the "snake hands," where the two lines swung close together a spur track connecting the two main lines was built. This point was named Pacific Junction. Recently it was decided to give the locomotives of the I. C. R. the benefit of a farther stretch of the Transcontinental, and Pacific Junction was moved eight miles farther away from Moncton to Catamount, where the N. E. R. and I. C. R. are near each other. At this place a spur has been constructed joining the two lines, and in future I. C. R. trains leaving and approaching Moncton will run for eleven miles over the Transcontinental.
