THE BRITISH STEAMER
CLODMOOR IN BATTLE

Fought Submarine in the Mediterran-ean-Believes He Left Submersible

Montreal, Aug. 3—The British steamer Clodmoor, just in port from Geona, Italy, had a battle in the Mediterranean with a German or Austrian submarine, so her commander, Charles Hunter, re-

ports.

He believes that he left the submaring inking.

The steamship is armed with one gun for defensive purposes and it was with this, her captain said, that he shelled the submarine when she attacked and so seriously damaged her that she drew off apparently sink-

ing.

The battle lasted half an hour, according to Capt. Hunter, but only one shell did serious damage to the Clodmoor. This pierced the vessel near the quarters of the engineer and mate. Several shells dropped on the vessel's decks.


