"While neither principal would comment on the nature of the proposals mooted at the meeting, it developed this morning that two lines of attack were suggested. Under the first the Liberals waive the right to contest any seat won by a Progressive at the last elections; the Progressives in turn waiving claims to contest certain seats which returned Conservatives last October. It is understood that Liberal claims were made to oppose Premier Meighen in Portage La Prairie.

"No definite agreement was entered into, it was stated, authoritatively but proposals set forth were discussed with a view to possible action and agreement at a later date." it became known today.

LONDON, July 7—Lively scenes were enacted in the House of Commons today during consideration of the vote on an application of £8,000,000 to pay coal bills abroad for fuel purchased by the government since the miners' dispute began.

The Labor members vigorously opposed buying more coal abroad; some of them did not mince words about it, but nevertheless the vote carried, 245 to 116.
