



Rev. E. C. Hennigar, clergyman, foreign missionary and soldier, returned from Japan on the early morning train today and is stopping at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Hennigar, 26 Orange street. He has been absent for six years and will spend 10 months in this homeland. lecturing, studying and enjoying his periodical

respite.

The young clergyman, who is esteemed by a large number of Saint John people, including schoolday friends, has been devoting his life to missionary work in Japan for 20 years, and his arrival home today rounds out this neat total. Mrs. Hennigar proceeded through the city earlier in the week to hasten to the bedside of her mother, wife of Rev. Mr. Hartt, in Sackville, N. B., who is ill.

Rev. Mr. Hennigar is stationed under the United Church of Canada at Matsumoto, in Central Japan, about eight hours by rail from the great city of Tokio. Matsumoto is no mean city itself, having a population of 60,000 and a surrounding population of 60,000 and a surrounding population of more than a quarter million. It is a very busy silk-spinning area, the staple product spun from the cocoon and recled for shipment to the weaving mills. It is in this centre the Saint John man follows his sacred vocation, and modestly states the efforts being put forth are bearing rich fruit.






