SHOT PUT RECORD AT HALIFAX MEET

Tacks on 63/4 Inches to Existing Record—"Billy" Maynes, Rubins, "Ed." Yeomans, Gordon Wilson, Also Win Firsts.

Showing marked improvement over form displayed at the final Olympic trials at Montreal last June, "Beef" Malcolm, husky young Trojans' A. C. star, smashed the Maritime shot-put record at the Maritime track and field championship meet at Halifax on Saturday by six and three-quarter inchess. The former record of 42 feet, made by H. B. Huill, Sydney, went by the boards when the St. John boy heaved the shot 42 feet, 6½ inches. Malcolm's record-breaking performance was the only one of its kind during the meet, which had three Canadian Olympic stars competing, "Billy" Maynes, "Phil" MacDonald, and Victor MacAuley. All three won, their events, Maynes taking the 440 yards and placing second in the 880, MacDonald winning two firsts, three seconds and a third, while the Windsor marathoner easily took the five-mile event.


