Easy & Practical Home Dress Making Lessons

IN BLUE TAFFETA.

Use of net, linen and crash designs. The wide belt which encircles the waist close to the bottom is finished with a most unconventional knot, from which the ends hang loosely.

To make the dress requires, for a girl of average size, 2 1/2 yards of double width taffeta and 1 yard of 36-inch satin for the belt, collar and cuffs. The buttons may be covered with satin.

To avoid mistakes place each piece of the pattern carefully on the taffeta. First fold the silk, and along the lengthwise fold lay the pieces marked by triple "T" perforations—that is, the collar, back and back yoke. The front gore, front, sleeve, cuffs and sleeve bands are arranged on a lengthwise thread of the material. For the open neck, cut out neck edge of front 1/2 inch above small "o" perforations. For short sleeves, cut off lower part of sleeve on small "o" perforations. Cut off front edge of left front and left front gore on double "o" perforations. Close under-arm seam as notched to make the waist; also shoulder seam. Gather lower edge of front and back between double "o" perforations. Center-front indicated by large "O" perforations. If made high neck, sew standing collar to neck edge as notched. For open neck, see cutting directions. Sew large collar to neck edge, center-backs even and along small "o" perforations in front.

Gather lower edge of sleeve between double "T" perforations, join sleeve-band as notched, close seam as notched. Close cuff seam as notched to small "o" perforation, sew to sleeve-band as notched. Sew sleeve in arm-hole, seam at notch in front.

Join gorges of skirts as notched. Pleat casing on skirt perforations, bring folded edge to small "o" perforations and press. Turn hem on small "o" perforations. Sew to lower edge of waist, centers even. Large "O" perforations in front gore indicate center-front.

This design is so practical and pretty that it will look well developed in tub materials for summer use.

Taffeta is used for this very stylish little dress, and it is trimmed with buttons and satin girde, collar and cuffs. The model is also suitable to development in tub materials.

Many of the new spring models for little girls' frocks are made on blouses—that is, with the very long waist and skirt that is scarcely more than a straight flounce. This smart coat is in changeable blue taffeta trimmed with satin of the same color. The collar and cuffs may be varied, however, by the years.

QUESTION OF BABE BORN AFTER FATHER'S DEATH

Court Asked to Rule as to Whether or Not He Shares in Estate

New York, May 8—Supreme Court Justice Davis has decided that a child born after the will of the father is made in which the child is not specifically mentioned has no interest in the estate. The suit was brought by S. Stanwood Menken, as executor of the estate of David C. Andrews, worth more than \$100,000, to have the will judicially determined that Joseph A. Andrews, the infant, had no interest in the estate. The widow, Mrs. Frances L. Andrews, joined in the action.

In giving judgment for the plaintiff Justice Davis said:

"The question is, did the testator die leaving his son, Joseph Andrews, unprovided for by the settlement and neither provided for nor in any way mentioned in such will. It is admitted that no settlement was made for such son, and of course he is not mentioned in the will. But the class to which the son belongs is mentioned. The testator mentions all children that may be born to him and his wife, and these children get his estate, share and share alike, in case his wife predeceases the testator. I think this provision of the will clearly shows that the testator contemplated the possibility of children being born to him and his intention to provide for them out of his estate in case his wife predeceased him. And his intention as expressed in his will negates the idea of inadvertent or unintentional disinheritance of his children to be born."

Chicken Dishes
