ELEANOR BOYCE IS IN FIRST PLACE

St. Peter's Girl Leads City in High School Examinations Jean Somerville of Victoria Nearly Equal — Boys Are Outdone

The list of those who had successfully passed the High School entrance examinations was given out today by Superintendent H. S. Bridges. It shows the number of pupils who had made the grade in 1912 of 270, which is a very good sized class, slightly larger than last year. As many of them however will not take the High School course, it is difficult to forecast as to whether or not there will be much crowding when school resumes. Three hundred and fourteen scholars tried the examinations, and thirty-five of them failed to make the required marks, while of the remainder, one hundred and fifteen passed in the first division, one hundred and one in the second, and sixty-three in the third.

For another year the honors are to be awarded to the girls. There is a very close race for first position between two of them, while the boys do not appear in the first division in such large numbers as their fair opponents, nor do their marks come nearly so high.

Miss Eleanor Boyce, a pupil in St. Peter's Girls' School, North End, is credited with the distinction of leading the pupils of all the schools in the city, with a total of 88.5, while Miss Jean Somerville, of the Victoria school is only one and a half behind, her total being 87.0. The set of papers written by each of these girls will be sent to Fredericton for re-examination to decide the medal winner, and it is likely that these will be the only two to be sent as there are no others within fighting distance. Quite a number of girls made more than 80, which is considered a very good mark, but only four boys are credited with so encouraging a total. The names and marks follow:

PARTITION OF THE GILBERT ESTATE

Will it Be Building Lots or For Industrial Purposes?

Matter Before D. Mullin, K. C., Today as Master of Chancery—He Reserves Decision—Two Probate Cases

In the matter of the Gilbert estate hearing in the suit for partition brought by Thomas Gilbert, was had before D. Mullin, K. C., master of chancery, this morning, when argument of counsel took place. Thomas Gilbert has an undivided one-quarter interest in his valuable estate; the Bradford Gilbert estate has also an undivided one-quarter interest, and Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson has the remaining undivided one-half interest in the estate.

Several hearings have been held, and considerable evidence has been given with respect to the value of the property and the best mode of making an equitable division.

On behalf of the plaintiff, Thomas Gilbert, it was contended this morning that the property should be subdivided into building lots, and sold as such, while for the defendants, it was argued that the land being naturally most suitable for industrial purposes, it would be much more valuable if it were divided into large blocks, and so proportioned. It was contended that the acreage necessary for streets and the cost of laying out the same would also be saved.

The master reserved his decision, saying that he would look carefully into the evidence before giving judgment. W. A. Ewing, K. C., appeared for Thomas Gilbert; M. G. Teek, K. C., for the Bradford Gilbert estate and L. P. D. Tilley for Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson.

In the probate court today, the will of John Bradley, of 54 Bridge street, blacksmith was proved. He gives his estate to his two sisters, Agnes Collins and Catherine Gallagher, widow of William Gallagher, and to his sister-in-law Margaret Bradley, wife of Charles Bradley, all of St. John, and nominates Mrs. Agnes Collins executrix. She was accordingly sworn in.

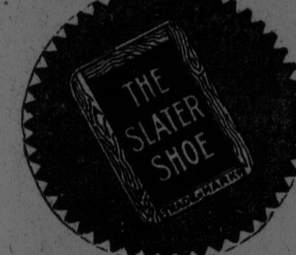

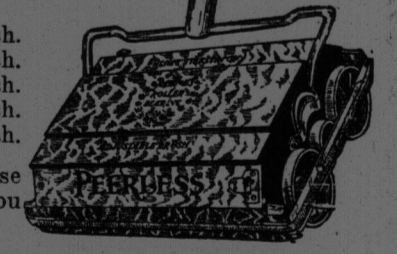
