CARRERA HAS LONG HISTORY

Ancient Indian Vehicle That Has Been in Use Over Two Hundred Years

The ancient carreta, now in the exhibit room of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, has had an eventful history, as we learn from the report of Altona, a Teague Indian, eighty-five years of age, who said that it had belonged to his grandfather and that it had been exhibited at a local fiesta years before as the oldest carreta in the neighborhood.

On November 23, 1898, this old cart left Redlands, Cal., on its own wheels and reached Los Angeles December 15, a distance of over sixty miles.
