Speaking of the high death rate from typhoid fever in the province, during the month of October, Dr. Bryce, the Provincial Health Officer, says there can be no doubt but that the unusual length of time during which mild weather continued this autumn, there not being any frosts practically up to the end of October has played an important part in extending the period during which typhoid fever from polluted wells

tend to spread. From all over the country water samples have been sent to an unusual number, to the provincial laboratory for analysis. In almost every instance the samples have been well waters, and in very few instances have no direct evidences of polution by waste matters been proven. Speaking generally it may be said that in 110 towns, cities and villages in Ontario where public water supplies exist, typhoid fever cases are almost invariably traced to parts of the places where the wells have not been closed, while of course all water supplied in rural districts is from wells.
